#### Dear All

At the beginning of April we are nearly halfway through Lent and looking forward to Holy Week and the Easter celebrations. Lent has caused us to reflect on what we do with our time and resources and our contribution to God's plan for us in the Parish. In the middle of March the vacancy process for the selection of



our new Priest—in-Charge concluded with the interview of the candidates. Sadly we were unable to make a selection and we must now reflect on how to proceed, with a view to re-advertising the post and interviewing again in a few months' time. Whilst it is disappointing not to have appointed a Priest, in many ways it has been a positive experience, enabling us to work together to identify what we are seeking in a new Rector and it has also drawn us closer as communities in the Parish. On behalf of the PCC I would like to thank the many people who have contributed in making the process work and for their continued support.

In the meantime we need to focus on Easter, the most significant festival in the Christian calendar, when we reflect on the death of Jesus Christ and celebrate his Resurrection on Easter Morning. Throughout Lent we have had talks across the benefice on the role of Lay Pastoral Assistants (LPAs) and the Warminster Food Bank, which have challenged us to reflect on our individual role and contribution to the church and community.

Please note the final **Lent Talk** will be a presentation on **The Role of Street Pastors in Warminster** to be held at Chapmanslade School starting at 7.30 pm on **Thursday 3rd April**.

Finally special thanks to Revd Di Britten, our Associate Priest, for all the time and effort she puts into looking after our spiritual needs and the practical aspects of running the Benefice. She is indeed a blessing and we would be lost without her.

#### **Nature Notes**

Finally it has stopped raining and when the sun comes out it feels absolutely gorgeous. Spring has sprung! The increase in temperature with the longer days has stirred nature into action. Everywhere there are signs of life; trees coming into bud, bumble bees are buzzing and birds pairing up. The dawn chorus is really going.

Our pond has come alive with amphibians. First the toads arrived, a

week ago we went out in the late evening with a torch and estimated approximately over a hundred individuals, quite an orgy! Toad spawn is laid in chains deep in the pond amongst weed which makes it less vulnerable. The toads appear to be active at colder temperatures than the frogs. We have only recently had frog activity; they seem to like warm sunny days with their mating activity takes place at the pond surface. You can see their heads with their bulbous eyes poking out from the water and they make quite a noise croaking away. (Toads make a higher pitched squeaky noise.) So far I estimate we have had about twenty frogs on the surface at one time, nowhere near the number of toads! The frog spawn is laid on the pond surface and is therefore more vulnerable, last year it became frozen in the ice and none survived. Spawn of any type is very attractive to ducks and we have already had a pair of mallards working their way through the weed after the toad spawn. So far the frog spawn has avoided such predation but I am sure it won't last. Surprisingly we have not had a visit from a heron, unless it comes when I am not around in the early morning or during the night, they readily take frogs and toads.

One morning, about ten days ago when I opened the curtains, I saw the silhouette of a large bird in the cherry tree which overlooks the pond. As I watched it swooped down onto the pond surface and with talons outstretched caught something and flew up onto the summerhouse roof then over to the nearby tree stump covered in ivy. It was a buzzard and I watched as it used it's beak to tear whatever it had caught up into digestible pieces. Once it had finished it flew back onto the summerhouse roof and then repeated the 'osprey like' fishing action successfully again and returned to the tree stump. Finishing the second meal it took up position again on the summerhouse but I must have made some movement and it flew off with the characteristic lazy flight. It was a frosty morning so it is unlikely any amphibians were on the surface of the pond. Looking through binoculars I could only see pond snails that it could have plucked from the water. I checked the tree stump, when I went outside, to find any leftovers to identify what the buzzard had been eating. There were strands of pond weed and a dried up bit of flesh so I think it must have been catching the snails, which are quite big, extricating the snail from the shell with its hooked beak.

Last Sunday was the warmest day of the year, so far, and we went over to Langford Lakes and saw lots of butterflies; small tortoiseshells, brimstones, one peacock and one comma which all over winter as the adults. Before we left home I had noticed brimstones and small tortoiseshells, rescuing four of the latter from the garage. From one of the bird hides at the reserve we spotted a coot on a nest with eggs.

# **Upper Deverills Litter Pick**

The annual Upper Deverills litter pick took place on the 15th March and the Parish Council would like to extend its sincere thanks to the many volunteers who gave up their morning to clean up the Parish. The litter pickers reflected there was probably less litter than last year and the haul was also less exciting. Whereas last year's pick revealed an intriguing variety of whisky bottles, wing mirrors and contraceptive pills, this year's collection was altogether more mundane - characterised by coffee cups and crisp packets. Notwithstanding the boring nature of the 2014 finds, some intriguing trends emerged. Litter on the Hindon road reflected a taste for cheap lager, crisps and yoghurt. The Maiden Bradley road revealed a preference for more up-market lager combined with Red Bull and chocolate. An amateur time and motion study revealed that the time taken to consume a Coop sandwich and coke, purchased in Mere is equivalent to the time taken to drive to Kingston Deverill, 200 metres west of the Church. Clearly, the need to change gear on the hill is a catalyst for hurling the can and sandwich wrapper into the verge. Sincere thanks to all the litter pickers. Until next time.

#### An Old Agriculturist's Ramblings by Ian Woodcock - Part 8

Being encouraged to produce even more milk by the powers that be the landlord kindly provided the building to house a milking parlour. This had a pit down the middle so that the cows udders were at eye level. The milking equipment had to be supplied by me, we gradually increased the herd to 160 cows, looked after by one operator who had the use of 10 milking units milking 10 cows at once.

To house these extra animals we installed cow kennels for 120 and an adjoining building to house the other 40. This enabled us to keep the 40 best yielding ones separately to give them special treatment to produce more. To provide more silage for these extra cows entailed building another sleeper sided silo which meant growing more grass, cutting down my cereal acreage, which I was loth to do, but milk provided a greater income. By then at the peak production in the autumn daily output was approaching 2,600 litres. I well remember the first time in 1958 when we achieved a daily output of 450 litres (100 gallons) we were ecstatic. With all the extra slurry produced a large slurry pit was dug which was emptied each autumn by a contractor with a Hy-Mac, loading five dung spreaders to be applied on stubble and ploughed in. This caused a few complaints of the smell but it soon dispersed!

I forgot to mention in the early days of expanding cow numbers I enquired of the cowman if he would consider taking on managing the herd by contract, I would pay him so much a gallon produced and he would arrange his own relief. This he agreed to. A load off my shoulders! This system was used until I retired in 1988.

#### **Spring Funding available for Local Charities**

The Community Foundation is keen to hear from community groups and local charities who could do with an extra funding boost this spring. The main grant round takes place in early May and the closing date is 17 April so there is time to get organised and submit your application. Grants of up to £5k are available to support and maintain organisations which make a difference to their local communities. You do not even need to be a registered charity as long as your organisation is based in Wiltshire, benefits Wiltshire residents and you have a constitution and a bank account. The Community Foundation will fund core costs such as salaries, equipment and training, as well as new projects.

Recently funded projects include Seeds 4 Success, a new Wiltshire charity which runs a leisure credit scheme in south Wiltshire for NEET (Not in Education, Employment or Training) young people offering them training in exchange for environmental volunteering work. The grant is paying for an additional youth worker without whom the scheme could not expand. Jaki Farrell of Seeds 4 Success said "The grant from the Community Foundation was vital for so many young people who would not otherwise get this chance. We are now able to provide essential support for volunteers and ensure liaison with local parishes and communities plus promotion and administration work." Last month young people cleared a cemetery in Wardour, carried out hedge trimming and tree felling in Mere and raised over £370 for the charity packing bags in supermarkets, which was almost as popular as the quad biking reward trip. One said "I've learnt how to use different kinds of tools and improved my skills at working with people. I enjoy being respected by local people because of the work we do and I like the rewards."

## Kingston Deverill School - A Short History

The first mention of any educational activity in Kingston Deverill occurs in a document entitled 'The Education of the Poor Digest' published 1818. Apparently there were 'Two Dames Schools, usually attended by 24 children' and 'A Sunday School, containing about 50 children, supported by voluntary contributions, which are both small and uncertain'.

In far off Scotland John Knox had proclaimed the ideal of 'Universal Education' in the 1570s, and although his ambition was not realised in his lifetime, the Scottish Education Act of 1633 stated that a school should be founded in every rural community, and by the end of the 17th century this aim had been accomplished throughout the lowland areas of the country.

England was a little behind – 178 years in fact – since it was not until 1811 that the Church of England set up what became known as 'The National Society' to promote the education of the rural poor in our part of the world. It took some time. 'Dames Schools' and 'Sunday Schools' had existed in some villages for many years, but the former were usually no more than day care establishments for infants, and the latter, for obvious reasons, offered religious instruction only.

At the time of the 1818 report, the Rector of Kingston Deverill (KD) was Josiah Thomas (1782-1820), but it is evident that he was non-resident and probably ill when the report was published, since the details of the educational establishment in the village were given to the commissioners by a stipendiary curate, John Offer. (John had succeeded a previous curate, Thomas Heathcote, who is described as receiving a 'stipend of £60 and all surplice fees' and 'permitted to reside at Longbridge Deverill (LD) as the KD parsonage house is unfit'.)

The next mention of education in the area comes from a report entitled 'The Abstract of Education Returns' which was published in 1835. According to this, the Dames Schools and the Sunday School at KD no longer existed, although there were thriving Sunday Schools at Monkton Deverill (MD) and LD, and it is possible that children from KD attended one of these. However, by this stage the connection between the church at KD and the 2nd Marquess of Bath at Longleat was more firmly cemented by the appointment in 1831 of the Marquess's third son Lord John Thynne as Rector, with the result that there was an obvious opening for increased patronage of the Church of England – and by inference the National Society – by the Thynne family. That this was indeed the case has been proved by a recent discovery in the Longleat archives of a document which states that a carpenter's cottage tenanted by a Mr Young on the site of the present School House was taken back into ownership by the Marquess of Bath in 1840, and set up as a school. That was the beginning.

#### **Church Electoral Roll**

Under Church of England rules, we are required to update the Electoral Roll. Should you wish to add your name to the Roll it will be necessary to complete a new application form. This is necessary to prepare the Roll for the Annual Parochial Church Meeting. The Electoral Roll is the formal list of members of the Church who are entitled to vote at the Annual Meeting. There are eligibility requirements but most baptised worshippers over the age of 16 will be eligible. It is important that everyone who is eligible joins the Roll in order that the membership is truly representative of the Parish. It is also helpful to the clergy to keep in touch with church members and to offer appropriate pastoral care. Application forms are available in the churches or from the Electoral Roll Officer, Diana Abbott 840763 or 29, The Marsh, Longbridge Deverill, BA12 7EA. #### Friends of the Deverills Churches - a new charity

The charity's objects are: (a) to raise and target money towards maintenance and improvement of the beautiful churches of the Deverill Valley in Wiltshire, their fixtures and fittings and possessions but not contributing to the liturgical and related functions of the Church of England; (b) to co-operate with and support the Parochial Church Council of the Deverills or its successor in the spending of that money.



Last year the Parochial Church Council invited a number of us living in the Valley to form a committee to be known as Friends of the Deverills Churches with the sole and specific purpose of raising funds to help maintain the fabric of our churches. I write now as the Chairman of the Friends to enlist your help.

You may or may not be a churchgoer, but we are sure you would wish to see the three churches in our beautiful Valley properly maintained. They are key features of our villages; indeed the recent draft Parish Plan for the Upper Deverills noted that the churches were "significant tourism assets" within the Parish. Furthermore, with the very successful exhibition for the Art Trail, music concerts and in May this year the Deverills Festival, the church buildings have become more widely used for the benefit of everyone in the valley and all those who pass through it.

The challenge facing the PCC is that there will be a considerable shortfall in funds needed to meet the requirements of the recently completed Quinquennial Review of the fabric of the churches for essential maintenance. This situation is being faced by many parishes in the country, and a large number have formed an association, usually called the Friends of the Parish, with the aim of raising money to close that funding gap. I should emphasise that the funds we raise will be specifically for the fabric of the churches and not for liturgical purposes or any other business of the PCC.

We feel sure that many people in the Valley will want to help. When Richard Askew was our Vicar he led a very successful fundraising campaign to restore the interiors of our churches to mark the Golden Jubilee in 2002. Many people in the Valley contributed and we hope, with your support, we shall be equally successful.

# Slipper Aubergine, Tomato & Goat's cheese Recipe sponsored by Maiden Bradley Community Shop

Ingedients

6 medium sized aubergines olive oil

16 pitted black olives 2 x 400g tins chopped tomatoes 2 tbsp capers 2 x 120g goat's cheese logs

Freshly grated parmesan cheese

#### Method

Heat the oven to 220c/gas 7. Halve the aubergines lengthways, cutting through the stalk. Use a small sharp knife to cut a lattice almost to the base but without puncturing the skin. Smear lavishly with olive oil, arrange in a roasting tin and bake for 25 mins until soft . Slice the olives into thirds. Drain the tomatoes, then mix with the capers and olives. Spoon the tomatoes mixture over the aubergines and cover with thick slices of goat's cheese, dredge with parmesan. Return to oven or under a hot grill to burnish the cheese and heat the aubergine mixture. Serve immediately.
