

The Rev Norma Payne writes: -3-

Friday 16th March saw local people turn out in support of the 3rd Battalion, Yorkshire Regiment, as four hundred young soldiers marched through the town on the way to the Minster Church for a pre-deployment to Afghanistan service. The occasion had taken on a different feel because of the deaths of their colleagues already in Afghanistan as part of the advance party. The padre preached a 'cracking good sermon' and it was obvious to see the special relationship he had with the men.



One of the most moving parts of the service was the lighting of a lantern which was lit, with the promise that it would burn day and night until the return of the regiment, as a sign of the prayers of the town which would accompany the regiment.

As I reflected on the service, I was struck by its significance. In Lent, we journey towards the passion and death of Christ on Good Friday and his resurrection at Easter. The symbolism of 'light' is so strong within our Christian tradition, and it is embodied in our Easter celebrations. When we live in the light of the risen Jesus, we discover the possibility of transformation. God's love revealed in the outstretched arms of Christ on the cross has power to move us into a place of hope that things can and will be different. After the darkness of Good Friday, new hope and life comes as Easter dawns.

May that hope and life be real for all who have lost friends and colleagues. May it be real for families who wait for the safe return of those they love. May it be real for us as we celebrate the great festival and season of Easter. Happy Easter to you all!

Padre's Parcels

The Labyrinth

What is a labyrinth? It is a meandering path with no dead ends or junctions unlike and often confused with a Maze. They were widely used in the middle ages, inlayed into the floors of naves in cathedrals across Europe for pilgrims to walk in contemplation. In England they were incorporated in roof bosses and other forms of building decoration. Two medieval examples remain, a roof boss at St Mary Redcliffe and one in the Mappa Mundi in Hereford Cathedral. During the revival of church building in the Victorian period several labyrinths were inlayed into the floors of chapels and churches but the only one designed to be walked was in Cathedral. In recent decades several modern examples have been constructed, most notably Batheaston (1985) Norwich Cathedral (2000) and St Michael's Abingdon (2008). The recent revival of interest is based on findings of the therapeutic effect walking a labyrinth has on people. There are now mobile ones available for placing in halls, schools and public places and many groups are creating permanent ones in parks. Anyone can gain from taking a few minutes to step out of their daily rushed lives and allow their mind to release control and let the path guide them to a central place of calm. They can and are used in pilgrimage. To walk a labyrinth takes one on a journey. The literal path becomes the symbolic path of life, a path of destiny, to God. As one steps on to the path you can shed all the daily clutter and worries.

Nature Notes

Looking out of the window first thing these last few mornings you could be forgiven for thinking that it was September rather than March; mists, heavy dew and cobwebs showing up like necklaces on the hedges. I'm sure the plants and animals are getting just as confused as we are with the weather. At least the daffodils are right on time and giving us a lovely show, and this morning I noticed more blossom in the hedgerows as I drove over to Heytesbury for my Pilates class.

Last weekend the gorgeous warmth of the sun encouraged lots of bumble bees out to forage for nectar. We had 2 or 3 at a time working their way around the patio. About a fortnight ago, walking near Shearwater, I saw a brimstone butterfly. We've also had ladybirds waking up on warm days; most appear to be the harlequin variety.

The birds are all in their stunning breeding plumage now. This afternoon I caught sight of 4 gorgeously glossy starlings on the top of the beech hedge, they were just shining in the sun as if they had been polished. The male chaffinches look very smart and I have been mistaken several times recently thinking that we had a male bullfinch in the garden, but no sadly just a chaffinch. The birds are becoming increasingly territorial. I often look outside to see a pair of cock pheasants sparring and I am always seeing male birds of other species chasing one another sometimes with disastrous consequences when one hits a window. Several chaffinches have come unstuck in this way, luckily most have survived with mild concussion. Nest boxes are being viewed with more purpose now. I don't think any are taken yet, and one in particular has been viewed by tree sparrow, great tit and blue tit.

At the beginning of March we had a male siskin visit the feeding station, always the one at the front of the house. He must have been around for about a week but then moved on. Hopefully he will be back with a mate in tow. I have seen a lovely song thrush in the garden several times recently. We have had one singing for a while but the only view I have had has been a singing silhouette in the tree. The recent sightings have been much clearer; washing in the birdbath, pulling up worms and foraging for grubs along the bough of the tree just outside

the kitchen window. There have been mistle thrushes in the garden recently too. I am hopeful that they may be considering building a nest nearby. They are much bigger than the song thrush, more the size of the fieldfare.


The pond in the garden of our house in the village has a pair of mallard; I think they have been attracted in by the frogspawn. There was a good amount but the ducks have been eating it, their equivalent of our caviar! Hopefully the frogs will mate again and produce another batch. When walking over the bridge in Sand Street this afternoon I caught sight of 5 little egrets all fishing in close proximity, and I thought afterwards that you never see herons fishing so close together. Not so long ago it was an event to see a little egret around here, now you see them daily. Yesterday just after mid-day I heard one of my favourite bird calls, the burble

Wylye Land/Penhill Valley threat of new Pumping Station

For most of us the character of Monkton Deverill is defined by the unspoilt views towards the village from Penhill and its setting in the open valley. This character is important to all of us who live here and the many people who use the roads, bridleways and footpaths through the Deverill Valley.



Wessex Water are proposing a major upgrade of their water grid to improve water supplies to Salisbury and they have identified a c1.5 acre site at the bottom of the Penhill Valley to build a 240 metre square building, one and a half storeys high with associated parking that would be used as a pumping station.

Their preferred site is just off the Hindon Road, the lane that runs down to Monkton Deverill from the A350 in the east corner of the field known as Pub Ground named after the former use of Monkton House.

They appear to have identified this site in the course of a desk exercise purely on the basis of engineering and cost and with no consideration to the impact it will have on the landscape and its underlying archaeological interest.

It is hard to imagine a more visible and damaging location for such a major development anywhere in this unspoilt valley. This huge site and planned major building would lie immediately adjacent to the intersection of a road, a bridleway and a footpath. It would be impossible to landscape such a facility into obscurity as it lies at the focal point of the valley and will always be seen from the village and from the many public vantage points which surround this beautiful downland.

Pub Ground itself has significant archaeological interest and is currently managed under a Higher Level Stewardship Scheme which has seen arable operations ceased in order to protect the underlying archaeology with a well established flower rich meadow on which birds and insects now thrive.

Simply put, Wessex Water's current plans would devastate this open and timeless downland landscape and the historic setting of Monkton Deverill village itself.

Wessex Water have offered to attend a meeting with our community to answer questions on the scheme and hear local views. Details of this meeting are set out below. We believe this meeting is essential to allow the community to let Wessex Water know its feelings on this issue as the first stage in what may be a protracted campaign to save our landscape.

Recipe of the Month - Organic Beef Pie

Sponsored by Maiden Bradley Community Shop (844206) **Ingredients for 4 Portions**

400g organic Aberdeen Angus beef shin, diced

500g self-raising flour

1x local, dirty carrot, peeled and diced 1 tsp salt

250g fresh beef suet large onion peeled, diced

1 x sprig of thyme 300ml water

a little plain flour for coating beef 50g unsalted butter 1 x glass of red wine (a rich Bordeaux) 50ml rapeseed oil

4 parsnips, peeled and chopped 1 ltr very rich beef stock

Method Maldon salt and pepper

The day before, in a casserole heat the rapeseed oil, fry beef and add a little plain flour, onion and carrot and fry until a lovely caramelised colour appears. Add thyme and red wine and reduce, then add the stock, season with salt and pepper and slowly braise for 3-4 hours. Allow to cool.

The following day heat the oven to 200° C (piping hot). Make the suet crust by adding self-raising flour to the suet and salt and trickle water in a bit at a time. Roll
