

It is a great privilege to be asked to conduct a marriage service and share in the preparations for the service on the 'big day'! Every service 20 is special and hopefully memorable for the couple as they commit themselves to one another in the promises and vows they make.



If you have heard Banns of Marriage called recently, you might have wondered about the meaning of the words 'and having a qualifying connection with this parish. In 2008, the Church of England made it easier for people with a connection to a particular parish to be married there, even though they were not resident in the parish or on the church electoral roll. The new qualifying connections are that the bride or groom:

- was baptised in the parish
- was confirmed in the parish
- has at some time resided in the parish for at least 6 months
- has attended public C of E worship in the parish for at least 6 months Further qualifying connections are if a parent of the bride or groom
- was married by a C of E service in the parish
- has resided in the parish for at least 6 months during the lifetime of the bride or groom
- has attended public C of E worship in the parish for at least 6 months during the lifetime of the bride or groom.

It is a joy that couples wish to make their commitment to one another in church and to seek God's blessing. If they no longer live in the parish, but can still be married here using a qualifying connection is all to the good. Incidentally, it is wonderful to hear people speak fondly of a particular church and why they wish to be married there. I am pleased that the Marriage Measure makes it easier to offer a welcome to those who wish to be married in the parishes of our Benefice. Whether it is banns or bells that remind you of weddings taking place, please pray for the couples married here. Thank you.

New Plastic bottle and cardboard recycling service

As you may have seen in the Coming Soon leaflet that dropped through your door in July, Wiltshire Council is introducing a new plastic bottle and cardboard recycling collection service across the county from the autumn. In the West, the new plastic bottle and cardboard recycling collection service will start at the beginning of November 2011, with new blue-lidded bins being delivered to households throughout October. Residents will receive an instructional leaflet and collection calendar information through the post shortly before the bins are delivered, explaining how to use the service and when to put the blue lidded bin out for collection. Slightly different arrangements have been made for residents who live in flats, and an assessment will be carried out on each individual block of flats to determine exact bin requirements. This is explained in more detail in the information being delivered through the post before the bins arrive. Ancient Barrows

Having been on two archaeology related walks recently I reached for the 'The Deverill Valley' or locally known the 'Green book', and was intrigued to discover there are three long barrows within walking distance of where I live in Kingston Deverill. One near the summit of Cold Kitchen Hill, one on Pertwood Down, and a small one on the lower slopes of Cold Kitchen Hill. On Middle Hill, south of Kingston Deverill, is a disk barrow. When this barrow was opened a Faience necklace of over forty amber, jet and faience beads separated by bone spacer plates was found. This is a very rare object, only two other complete necklaces of this type have been found in this country. The amber beads are identical to amber beads found in necklaces in shaft graves at Mycenae in Greece, the palace of King Agamemnon who lead the Greeks in the Trojan War as told by Homer in the *Iliad*. It is possible that these necklaces were made centrally in Europe and exported to Britain and Greece, showing that extensive trade routes had been established all over the know world.

The Wiltshire Core Strategy Consultation Document

This builds on the 'Wiltshire 2026 - Planning for Wiltshire's Future' consultation, which was undertaken in 2009/2010, and previous consultation exercises undertaken by the former district councils of Kennet, North Wiltshire, Salisbury and West Wiltshire. Since then, the government has introduced the Localism Bill, which proposes changes to the planning system, including the introduction of neighbourhood plans and the abolition of Regional Spatial Strategies, which identified levels of housing and job growth for areas such as Wiltshire.

As such, this consultation exercise provides the opportunity for you to have your say on new proposals for the level and location of new employment land to provide for job growth and new homes across Wiltshire. In addition, the consultation document sets out draft policies to ensure the sustainable delivery of new development within Wiltshire. These aim to maximise the benefits of development for local communities whilst at the same time conserving and enhancing Wiltshire's high quality environment.

The Core Strategy will be based on robust evidence about the challenges facing Wiltshire and the best and most realistic ways of meeting those challenges. This evidence has been gathered from a wide variety of sources, including commissioned studies. The views and aspirations of local communities are an important part of this evidence, these views have been collected through ongoing dialogue and structured consultation exercises, such as the Wiltshire 2026 consultation. The current consultation provides a further opportunity for the local community and other stakeholders to help shape the Wiltshire Core Strategy. Evidence base documents to support the emerging Wiltshire Core Strategy be viewed on the website www.wiltshire.gov.uk/ can planningpolicyevidencebase

A series of draft topic papers have been produced, collating evidence comprehensively. These will continue to be developed following the consultation, taking into account the response and will be finalised to support the publication of the draft Core Strategy. The draft topic papers include consideration of reasonable alternatives to the proposals presented in the consultation document, and give clear justification as to why these alternatives have not been pursued. The draft Topic Papers can be viewed at Wiltshire Council www.wiltshire.gov.uk/wcsconsult2011. The consultation period runs until Monday 8th August.

The Wiltshire Core Strategy aims to deliver sustainable development. A Sustainability Appraisal is being undertaken throughout the preparation of the Core Strategy. This Appraisal entails evaluating all potential options against a range of sustainability criteria, and scoring them in relation to how sustainable they are. A Habitat Regulations Assessment has been undertaken as required by European legislation regarding the integrity of internationally important wildlife sites to be protected. Both have helped shape this consultation document. The

Nature Notes

For me summer wouldn't be summer without the sight and sound of swifts; sickle winged high pitched screaming silhouettes that whiz through the sky above cities and towns. I have just been re-reading an article about them and it made a very important point that 'no other bird in Britain is so dependent on Man for its breeding sites as the Swift'. They nest high up in the roof space and are particularly attracted to old houses and churches where they can gain access more readily. So often when repaired swifts lose their nest site, a site that they will have used all their lives coming back to the same hole year after year. I read in the Warminster Journal Lawrence Church is trying to attract swifts to breed in the tower; I do that St. hope they are successful. I know that there were breeding swifts in North Row 2004/2005, as when I worked in town I saw swifts sweeping up under the eaves and disappearing at the corner of one of the cottages; sadly this cottage has since been renovated with new roof and weather boarding and the swifts literally locked out! But they must be breeding somewhere very successfully in town as I have seen very good numbers, two dozen or so putting on a tremendous display in the Lower Marsh Road area. We have some here in the village and I know there were some breeding at Monkton Deverill when I delivered the papers, back in the 90's. We have recently been to Dilton Marsh, Horningsham and Dunster and each time seen good populations of swifts. They are only here for a few months arriving on average at the beginning of May and leaving by the end of August. They lay a clutch of 2-3 eggs, which hatch after about 3 weeks, and in a good year the young develop quickly and can be ready to fly at about 6 weeks old. So during July and early August you often see parties of screaming young swifts flying fast and furious over the rooftops; wonderful to watch.

Our swallows and house martins are doing very well. I don't know exactly how many nests have fledged now but we certainly have very good numbers of both flying about. They attract predators, namely sparrowhawk and hobby. The sparrowhawk has been making frequent sorties through the garden and you know when it is about; the swallows and house martins start flying about fast and furious in all directions calling and generally making a confusing pattern for the hawk. They will even mob it and chase it away; safety in numbers. The blackbirds give out a high pitched alarm call and the garden empties of birds. Then the garden becomes unnaturally quiet. The sparrowhawk has taken quite a few young starlings and blackbirds and this morning I found evidence of dove/pigeon taken (a plucking site strewn with light coloured feathers). The tree sparrows are doing well, the Scots pine pair are raising their 3rd brood, and there is another tree sparrow family in the apple tree box.

We have found several road casualties recently. The first a female pheasant, then a handsome male hare at the entrance to our driveway and finally a beautiful grey partridge along the road between us and the Shearwater turning. The partridge plumage was absolutely spectacular, putting the imported red partridge to shame! All these casualties I've placed out on the open grass near the vegetable plot and they have been gratefully received......the birds plucked clean (corvid or buzzard I

Recipe - Sausages and Barbeque Beans Ingredients

6 good beef or pork sausages

4 teaspoons vegetable/rape/olive oil

1 medium onion chopped

½ green pepper chopped

2 medium apples, peeled, cored and chopped

1 400g tin of baked beans

60g sultanas

2 teaspoons curry powder mild

4 teaspoons brown sugar

1 tablespoon tomato puree

1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

1 teaspoon French mustard

Method

Grill sausages on a rack under a moderate heat, until cooked and golden brown all over. Cut each sausage into 2 or 3 pieces, set aside and keep hot. Pour oil into a large non-stick pan and gently sauté onion, pepper and apples for 2 to 3 minutes. Add baked beans and remaining ingredients and cook over a moderate heat until mixture is piping hot. Add sausages to the mixture and heat thoroughly. Season to taste with freshly ground sea salt and black pepper. Serve with creamy mashed potatoes. A quick and easy supper dish. Serves 3-4 depending on your appetite.
