The Rector writes:

It is interesting how some courses leave a greater impression than others. I attended one such course just last week. It was entitled 'Therefore choose life - defying the odds and embracing true hope over optimism.' I was intrigued by the title and decided to book a place. I am so glad that I did and I now share some of the wisdom I received with you.



The day was an opportunity to reflect on the complex issue of climate change. We were reminded about projected temperature rise with increasing carbon dioxide content, sea level rise and melting of polar ice, the shifting of the jet streams, the loss of habitable land and cultivation and food and water security and much more.

Human responses to such considerations are interesting. Knowledge about what is happening to the environment is not enough; we know what is happening but seem unable or unwilling to do anything about it because the issues seem so huge. We defend our own actions - *climate change isn't our fault*. The problem is so massive - why bother to do anything? If we have to change our behaviours, we only want to change a little. We **want** to limit climate change but continue to want the things that are causing it. 'Greed is seen as an economic virtue and frugality as an economic vice.' I have found myself thinking a great deal about those words as I make choices about what I want/need as I prepare to move house.

The challenge of the day was, while living with 'climate change' knowledge, to consider what can be done, something of integrity, to make a difference. As with so many things, it is one step at a time, changing small things within our own use of the world's resources. It is about 'speaking truth to power' and 'seeking to unmask illusion'. It is finding hope in the face of despair and understanding the mutuality of our human existence. Perhaps in those ideals, there is a vocation for us all.

Nature Notes

What a contrast in temperature to when I last wrote! From being unseasonably cold it is now exceptionally hot! It is perfect weather for hay making and Clive cannot remember when so much hay was made roundabouts. Back at Broomclose the majority of the grass fields have been cut for hay and baled. Silage would normally predominate.



With the hot weather the number of insects has increased which is good news if you are an insectivorous bird or a parent feeding young. If you are a seed eater then you are also well catered for now with the grasses and wildflowers are going to seed quickly in this hot weather. With such an abundance of food about I have found that the seed on offer at the feeding station in the garden is not going down so quickly. We have had quite a few youngsters helping themselves at the feeders: coal tits, blue tits, great tits, greenfinches, a goldfinch and a young great spotted woodpecker identified as such by its red cap. Three young starlings came for a while, rapidly demolishing the fat balls but they have gone elsewhere now. I have been putting some mealworms and sultanas out for the blackbirds. I had intended stopping them by now, but with this dry baking weather the ground has become so hard that they must be having a bit of difficulty in finding worms, so have decided to carry on feeding them. Blackbirds have numerous broods during the season and will more than likely still be feeding young.

We have had a family of mistle thrushes; they fledged just over a week ago. We know this because when I was watering the pots at the front of the house I almost watered a young one! It was trying to be inconspicuous and hide in the black grass. We could hear the parents nearby so our first thought was to leave it alone, but then realized how easily it could be found by a passing cat, so we encouraged it to move. It was very immature, still having a few downy feathers and unable to fly. It went towards the hedge, the parents came back down so hopefully they found each other. It is difficult to decide what to do, but it is best to leave a youngster for the parents to find unless it is in serious danger.

A male kingfisher visited our pond on the first day of July, a male as he had a black bill (females have orange lower bills - they wear lipstick!). He successfully caught a goldfish, proceeded to knock it out and turn it round in his bill to swallow and then dropped it! Not seen him since! Perhaps he is too embarrassed to come back! A week later I disturbed a heron one morning when pulling back the kitchen blinds; it had been fishing in the pond near the house.

We have had some interest in our swift box, several viewings! It was really exciting when they started flying round, going up to the box pointing, but the viewings did not result in a taker. It is too late now so we may be lucky next year. Passing The George today I noticed a swift flying up to the eaves which was encouraging. Playing the CD swift calls really excites the house martins,

Recipe - Pasta and Red Pepper Salad

Summer salads are popular for light eating in hot weather. Red peppers change when grilled and peeled and taste better than ever.



Ingredients: 250 gms pasta preferably spirals; 2 large red peppers; French dressing;

Chopped fresh sage.

Method: Cook the pasta in plenty of boiling salted water to which a tablespoon of olive oil has been added. When it is tender, drain it well and leave to cool. Cut the peppers into quarters and remove the stalk, inner membrane and seeds. Heat the grill to its highest temperature. Grill the peppers, skin-side uppermost, until the skin is black and blistered. With a small, sharp knife, remove all the skin. Cut the flesh into strips. Toss the pasta, pepper, dressing and sage together.

Wiltshire libraries - Summer Reading Challenge
