Juba Diocesan Secondary School - South Sudan

Some members of the Deverills congregation have been sponsoring a student in this new school during the past few years. Your generosity has been much appreciated. The School is flourishing and continues to grow and provide good education for older pupils in the Juba Diocese. The school now wishes to encourage more girls to attend secondary education. In South Sudan only 2% of girls attend secondary school, in the whole country only 400 girls are in their last grade of secondary education. This leads to many inequalities and means girls are denied positive female role models, for instance only 12% of teachers are female. A new nation needs educated and accomplished men and women. Girls need to become part of the professional classes that the nation so desperately needs. The school would like to build a Girls' Boarding House to ensure the safety of girls attending the school, many have been intimidated or attacked on their way to school. This would provide safety, positive role models and pastoral care by the women staff looking after them. The school has a plot of land for the Girls' Boarding House, architects' drawings and a bill of quantities have been developed. Now it is necessary to raise funds to begin constructing and equipping the building. Nature Notes

Halfway through November and we continue to experience mild weather. With this warmth comes moisture and we have had a lot of rain. I am sure the temperature will plummet soon and the birds will come back into the garden looking for food. At the moment I am still just feeding peanuts and fat balls, which are attracting great, blue, and long-tailed tits, house sparrows, greenfinches, great spotted woodpecker and the occasional goldfinch. Robins, blackbirds and chaffinches tend to feed underneath. I have been tempted to put some seed out but have decided to wait until the first frost. Also we will be moving from the farmhouse to The Marsh in the spring so I am reluctant to feed the birds too much food here so they become reliant on a food supply that will vanish just as they come up to breeding. I have told myself to be firm and only feed them well in very cold weather.....it won't be easy but I must be cruel to be kind. At the moment there is still plenty of natural food readily available in the form of insects, berries, seeds and worms. I am still seeing some 'good birds' despite less food being available. The water bath was visited by a song thrush and a mistle thrush the other morning giving very good views of both birds. Today I had a mistle thrush quietly singing in the tree above me. It was as if he was practising his song for the forthcoming breeding season. I have heard robins and blackbirds quietly singing in the undergrowth too. This morning I had a very good view of a goldcrest; the yellow crown was picked out like a beacon by the welcome sunlight. I have been hearing goldcrests in the garden for a while, a high pitched "zee-zee-zee" call, but today was the first time I saw one for certain.

Last Friday when I came downstairs to make the early morning tea, I looked out and at first couldn't make out what was going on. As I watched I realized that I was seeing a squirrel, that I can only describe as having fun. It was chasing up one tree, running down, dancing over to a bush, jumping in the air, twisting mid-air and darting around. I expected to see a playmate, but no it was on its own but being watched by several bewildered cock pheasants. It was lovely to watch and a good start to the day. Quite often the first bird that I hear in the morning these days will be a raven. Not so long ago it was a rare thing around here.

The redwings and fieldfares are back with us for the winter. They should find plenty of food around in the hedgerows and in the fields. I have been walking a dog for a friend recently and this evening we were near the golf course and a big flock of fieldfares flew over, they were only in silhouette but their distinctive "cha-cha-chack" call gave them away. Several times while walking a footpath next to the golf course, overlooking a steep drop into a combe, I have seen a male kestrel hunting. Today it was sitting on a post consuming what it had recently caught; it flew off as we got closer and I could clearly see it had the rest of the meal held safely in its talons. Walking in Longleat Woods with the dog we may have disturbed a goshawk. It was a big bird, buzzard size but it flew with much more accuracy through the dense conifer plantation than a buzzard. Sadly a fleeting glimpse.

Richard Stratton

Richard Stratton was born in 1916, the eldest of four children, at Manor Farm Kingston Deverill. He graduated from Cambridge University in 1937, and then returned home to the family farm. He was the third generation of Strattons at Manor Farm. During the Second World War approximately half the farm was taken over by the War Department as an extension of the Salisbury Plain training area, for use before the D-day landings. His father retired in 1945, and Richard had to re-build the farm. After the war, agricultural technology changed rapidly with the introduction of oil based fertiliser and sprays and horses were replaced by machines. The open areas of downland were ploughed to produce cereals and more productive grassland. He also loved trees, and in the 1960s started planting new woodlands to break up the open landscape of the downs. He retired from farming at Kingston Deverill in 1970.

Richard continued the family tradition of public work, and was involved with many local organisations and schools. He was a magistrate from 1966 - 1986, and High Sheriff of Wiltshire in 1981. His main recreation was fox hunting, he hunted and was involved with the South & West Wilts Hunt for almost 90 years. This included a period as Joint Master from 1971-1979.

The family would like to thank all those who visited him at Seagrams in his last years. He died peacefully in his own home - the Hunt was on the farm at the time – a perfect end to his 95 years in Kingston Deverill.

Recipe of the Month - Cheese Straws

Sponsored by Maiden Bradley Community Shop (844206)

Ingredients

100g/4oz plain flour	Pinch of salt
Pinch of cayenne pepper	50g/2oz butter
50g/2oz cheddar cheese, finely grated	1 egg yolk, beaten

Method

Sift the flour and seasonings together in a mixing bowl. Add the butter in pieces and rub together with finger tips until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs. Stir in the grated cheese and the egg yolk. Draw together with the fingertips to form a smooth dough, using a little cold water if the mixture is too dry. Chill in the fridge for at least 30 minutes.

Roll out the dough thinly on a floured board and cut into strips about 12.5cm/5 ins long and 0.5cm/quarter inch wide. Place on baking sheets and bake in fairly hot oven (200C/400F or gas mark 6) for 10 or 15 minutes or until golden. Remove from oven, allow to cool slightly then transfer to wire rack to cool completely. Store in airtight tin. Ideal for parties!

Where have you been?

The Bekynton Brasserie, Market Place, Wells BA5 2RF
(01749 675993)

I am grateful to Anni Jones of Longbridge Deverill for sending me this review. This place is named after Bishop Bekynton who gave Wells a public water supply in the fifteenth century. A friend and I have been out for another very enjoyable lunch, so I thought I would pass on details to the Parish News. The Bekynton Brasserie is on the Market Place at Wells. It is on two levels (both with picture windows) plus pavement tables so plenty of places to sit with a great view over the Square. There is a wide choice on the menu - which advises that all meals are freshly cooked and, as far as possible, ingredients are locally sourced - soups, sandwiches, salads, to more substantial meals plus 'today's specials' and several vegetarian choices. My friend enjoyed a lasagne while I tucked into deep-fried (but not greasy/oily!) plaice and chips. Both these came with a side-salad; the servings were ample and perfectly cooked. There was a good choice of desserts but we were too full to sample any! They do not have a full licence but do offer wine and beers. The ambience is fresh and cheerful and the staff friendly and welcoming - and they are open on Sunday.

My friend has heard that the present managers of The Flemish Weavers (in Corsham) are leaving at the end of the year. If we have a chance to visit once the new ones take over, we will let you know.
