Nature Notes

Earlier this week we had the first frost of the season. It certainly increased the number of birds coming to the peanuts and fat balls that I had put out. But there is so much food in the fields and hedgerows that now the temperature has increased, little bird numbers have gone back down. On that frosty morning we had 2 fieldfares investigating the apples in the garden but they were being chased off by the resident blackbirds. Back on the 19th October we had an influx of mistle thrushes (at least 6, but it could have been as many as 10; difficult to count) together with 3 redwings and a starling, all busy feeding on the lawn, bathing in and drinking from the pond. The pond continues to attract wildlife; most days wagtails come. During the summer grey wagtails predominated but now we are getting more pied ones. On sunny days that heat up the roof tiles they scurry about, calling and probing for insects from the tiles. They seem to fly between the house roof and the pond where dancing on the water-lilies stirs up other insect life. Amazingly we noted an emperor dragonfly flying out by the pond on 27th October which I thought was quite late in the year.



I reckoned to have seen my last butterfly of the year but yesterday, whilst working in the greenhouse, I was joined by a lovely red admiral. This butterfly overwinters as an adult as do the small tortoiseshell, peacock, comma and brimstone. Maybe this red admiral energized by the warmth of the sun had come into the greenhouse looking for a site in which to hibernate. It flew back out again into the afternoon sunshine possibly looking to feed, ivy flowers are a very important source of food at this time of the year for all insects. When moving pots around in the greenhouse I found another insect hibernating; a rather large beetle which I wondered might have been a female stag beetle. Fearing it might get squashed in amongst the pots, I carefully moved it to another out-house still in a pot filled with dry leaves. Hopefully it will survive the winter.



On the 22nd October we heard a fox calling from very close by fairly early in the evening; I usually associate their call with the dead of night. We have also had tawny owls calling on still nights, such a lovely sound, I think they are probably using the big cherry tree in the garden from which to call. Both these sounds I connect with winter, together with the pheasants squawking at dusk as they go to roost. So far it has been fairly mild but I hear that temperatures are about to tumble. At least there is plenty of food in nature's larder. Last winter birds and animals succumbed due to the lack of food and from the enduring cold. Talking earlier this week to Major Nigel Lewis, who works with the Hawk & Owl Trust, last winter was a disaster for owls and kestrels; many died and those that survived were not well enough to breed this year. They will need all the assistance we can give them to redress this, putting up nesting boxes is one way to help.

An Old Agriculturist's Ramblings - Part 4

In my last contribution I had forgotten to mention some events that occurred such as in the winter of 1951. The A350 was completely blocked by snowfalls, despite the Highways Authority erecting chestnut paling fences about 10-15 yards in the fields on the east side of the road to encourage the snow to drift in the field, unfortunately it was not too successful! The road remained blocked for three weeks, I don't recall how one coped but we survived despite the fact that I was a single man! My future wife used to visit me most weekends to restock my larder, arriving Saturday afternoon, spending the night at her brother's farmhouse at Horningsham (no chance of co-habiting in those days!) and then return to me Sunday morning to cook me lunch, then back to her house at Chisledon near Swindon. The road was finally cleared by the School of Infantry at Warminster with their heavy equipment, hence the reason for gates being erected to close the road in Longbridge.

Another event was at harvest time. With cereals stored in sacks, there was no bulk handling in those days. Some would be taken to Warminster station and loaded into covered wagons holding twelve tons in each. Lifting 2 ¼ cwt sacks of wheat up into the wagons and stacking them 3 high was very hard, hot work, which usually compelled us to stop at the local on the way back to the farm to collect the next consignment! The remainder was despatched by road transport, loading the lorries was much easier. With the amount of straw grown on the 1000 acres, barns were filled up for house consumption, some sold to dairy farms locally collected by them and some sent by rail to the West Country. None of this was loaded at Warminster station for some reason. I do not know why, but it was always taken to Heytesbury on to open wagons loaded by us and then secured and sheeted down by railway staff.

The cereal acreage was being increased. One down that had a number of banks or lynchets, as they were called, was levelled by bulldozers brought in by contractors, then ploughed by us and cropped. Another down we reclaimed by ourselves that was covered with gorse bushes and thorn trees, we endeavoured to do this with the equipment we already had. We attached a buck rake to a little grey Fergie pulled backwards with a Caterpillar D2. The driver of the Fergie only had to steer it but unfortunately once one of the buckrake tines penetrated the ground, bent round into a V shape and trapped the Fergie driver's foot under the foot rest. It went through the sole of his boot into his foot. Luckily I happened to be there to see how the work was progressing and managed to get the attention of the D2 driver to stop. We released his foot with difficulty and I took him to Warminster hospital. Fortunately no bones were broken, just severe bruising, it needed dressing and bandaging. He needed a few weeks off work, but soon back, he was a tough old boy! A further down called Big Down situated below Peewits Castle of 150 acres was never to be ploughed up by Colonel Jack Houghton-Brown's orders as it was

Update on Corfe Mullen to Salisbury Pipeline

Wessex Water (WW) held a briefing session at Kingston Deverill Village Hall on 22nd October giving information on the forthcoming construction of the Monkton Deverill Pumping Station, Summerslade Down Reservoir Tank and associated pipelines. This article highlights key points from the briefing and also potential impacts the construction will have on the community.



Construction is scheduled to start in **December**, with site preparation at the Monkton Deverill Pumping Station, Summerslade Down Reservoir and Keysley Farm. Access to the Monkton Deverill Pumping Station site will be via the B3095, approaching from Mere. Construction traffic associated with the Summerslade Down Reservoir site will be via the A350, and for the Keysley Farm site from the A303. Therefore, the impact of construction traffic on the B3095 should be reduced, no construction traffic should be travelling through the middle of Monkton Deverill. The primary WW Construction Office will be based at Summerslade Down, largest of the 3 construction sites, plus an office at Monkton Deverill Pumping Station.

There will be 3 associated pipelines linked to the local construction, which will all start from the Monkton Deverill Pumping Station. One will run up to Summerslade Down Reservoir (and beyond towards Codford), the other towards Keysley Farm, roughly following the existing road/track. The third pipeline will connect the Summerslade pipeline to an existing pipeline on the south west edge of Monkton Deverill, close to the B3095 at Monkton Green.

WW is re-visiting the requirement for a passing bay on the road leading to the Monkton Deverill Pumping Station. If it is determined there is still a requirement, WW stated its construction will not impact on the hedge on the east side of the road.

A number of roads will be affected during the construction. The Hindon Road will be closed for up to 4 weeks from the 3rd – 28th February while the pipeline to Summerslade Down is laid under it. It is likely the road will be closed for a shorter period but 4 weeks is being used for planning purposes. The B3095 will have traffic light controls in the area of Monkton Green from 3rd - 21st March, while the Summerslade Down pipeline is connected to an existing one. The Keysley Farm road leading from Monkton Deverill will be closed between 9th – 24th January (open at weekends), due to tree cutting (removal of branches rather than trees). It is possible that the work may be completed before 24th January.

Noise testing of the Monkton Deverill Pumping Station site will take place during the commissioning phase in order to confirm that the noise levels stated in the original planning application are not exceeded.

Construction completion dates for all 3 pipelines are expected to be by June 2014; the Monkton Deverill Pumping Station October 2014; the Summerslade Down Reservoir February 2015. Should residents wish to raise any issues, particularly during the construction phase they are encouraged firstly to contact the Parish

Recipe of the month - Iced Berries with White Chocolate Sauce

Sponsored by Maiden Bradley Community Shop

Ingredients:

500 g mixed frozen berries, 150 ml double cream,
150 g white chocolate, chopped, 1 tsp vanilla extract, 2 tbsp white rum

Method:

Put the frozen berries into the fridge 1 hour before serving to soften but are still icy. To make the sauce, put the cream, chocolate and vanilla into a small saucepan and heat gently, stirring continuously until the chocolate has melted. Leave to cool for 2 minutes, then stir in the rum. Divide the berries between 6 shallow bowls and pour over the hot sauce. Serve immediately before the fruits completely defrost. This a simple, light but delicious dessert. Resist it if you can!
