## The Rector writes:



December is upon us. The season of Advent is underway. Calendars and candles to help us with the countdown to Christmas have been available in the shops for months.

Advent is a season of preparation for Christmas. It is also the season when our thoughts turn to the Second Coming of Christ at the end of time. For most of us preparing for Christmas means doing the first and ignoring the second. We fill our time with the shopping for presents and food, writing and sending the cards, cooking, decorating the house with tree and greenery and probably much more besides. And we think that when 26th December dawns, Christmas is over!

Actually, Christmas Day is the *beginning* of twelve-day period of celebration as the song *The Twelve Days of Christmas* reminds us. Those twelve days end at Epiphany, the time the church commemorates the visit of the wise men to the Christ child. May our hearts be filled with joy at the coming of the Christ into the world. May that very joy lift us from the darkness of winter into the light and love of God.

Make this Christmas different! Seek a deeper meaning. Be counter cultural; do things differently. Give of your time; seek the company of a neglected friend; invite a single person to join you for a meal or a walk; give a charity donation as a present ~ there are lots from which to choose; don't buy more than you need; avoid waste. Make presents to give, rather than buying items simply for the sake of doing so. Meaning will return and the reason for the seasons of both Advent and Christmas will not slip by unnoticed.

## Broadband Survey Autumn 2010

The overall number of returns of the survey forms, issued with the October Parish News, to the Upper Deverills were, with the exception of Brixton (66%), somewhat disappointing. BAG (Broadband Action Group) do not believe this to be simply because Brixton are getting a poorer Broadband Service. In general, initial indications are that throughout the Upper Deverills Valley very slow speeds are a first concern although reliability may have improved since the last survey. Should you have **not** responded to this survey will you please do so now either by completing the form if you still have it or by email: Monkton: richard.kitson@virgin.net; Kingston: pjdavies096@btinternet.com. We can provide a further form or alternatively in your reply please indicate whether you are satisfied or not with (1) speed and (2) reliability; name your internet provider; and give an indication of how much monthly you might be prepared to pay for an improved broadband service, that would also include telephone rental. Suggested bracket £25 - £40. Please state if you might be prepared to bear a one off cost of £200-£300 to achieve this improvement. Your reply does not commit you.

We do need a bigger response if we are to have a chance of attracting the companies who are providing rural broadband to assist us, as well as seeking financial support. Thank you.

## Nature Notes

The colours this autumn have been spectacular, with the beech, oak and maple being especially noticeable. The leaves have stayed on for longer this year, I think, so we have had an extended show. The winds this last week dislodged quite a lot of leaves and things are now beginning to look bare. That makes it easier to see the birds, which is some compensation. The skies have been amazing recently too and I have often wished that I had a camera with me.



We have had more birds coming into the garden; as the days get shorter and colder they need to find a reliable source of food. There have been lots of tits, especially blue, but also coal, great and parties of long-tailed. The coal tits are at the bottom of the pecking order and shoot in when the bird feeders are quiet, grab a sunflower heart and zoom off with it. They cache food so that they have a store that they can fall back on during the winter. They have probably resorted to doing this because they are at the bottom of the pecking order at the feeders - clever. We had a male brambling in the garden on the 8th November, lovely to see and I thought quite early in the winter. Bramblings migrate to us from Scandinavia, where they breed, and their favorite winter food is beech mast, the nutritious nut-like seed of the beech tree. Two other winter visitors from Scandinavia have also arrived since I last wrote: redwings and fieldfares, both thrushes.

Having lost our kestrels on the farm earlier this year I am glad to say that we have a male kestrel about again. I was reminded the other day how varied the colour of a buzzard can be; I saw one up near the wood foraging on the ground for beetles and such like and it looked almost white at a distance especially when the sun shone on it. I have noticed more raven activity, I think this could be due to the forestry work up in the woods above Shearwater at the top of the farm; they roost and nest in this area normally and they have lost their trees and are looking for other suitable sites.

When walking, I normally see at least one deer, usually several together especially early morning or getting towards dusk. There is one that has a large yellow ear tag in its right ear. The other day it was following two other deer, a mother and youngster, and I am sure that it wanted to join these other two but the ear tag, which was flapping wildly in the wind, was frightening the other deer away. Eventually 'yellow tag' gave up the cause and went back towards the

## Job opportunity - Census Collector

Do you know of anyone looking to earn a bit of extra cash in the New Year? Capita Resourcing is undertaking a major recruitment drive for the 2011 Census, on behalf of the Office for National Statistics. The census will take place on 27th March 2011 – it takes place once every 10 years and provides a snapshot of the nation, this is an opportunity to be part of that and support the local community. There are over 29,000 Census Collector roles available in 2,000 locations across England and Wales, so there is a great chance of finding work close to home. Census Collectors contact householders to collect completed census questionnaires and assist where required. There is a choice of hours - 15, 25 or 37 hours a week, depending on availability and you will not be responsible for collecting the questionnaires.

## B3903 – Proposed Weight Restriction



As some of you will be aware a weight restriction of 7.5t is being considered for the B3095 (Longbridge Deverill to Mere Road), under the West Wiltshire Weight Limit Project. This project has now been running for some 2 years and the final report will shortly be passed onto the Wiltshire Council Cabinet member for Transport for consideration. Before making a decision the communities affected by the project will be given a final opportunity to comment on the proposals; it is hoped this process will occur before Christmas. Following this a decision will then be made as to whether the project will go ahead. Wiltshire Council is unable to give a firm date for a decision, other than to say they intend to take it before March 2011, otherwise the Traffic Regulation Orders for the project have to be re-advertised, a cost that Wiltshire Council wish to avoid.

### Reporting of Incidents - on B3095 & other roads within the Upper Deverills

In the current financial climate funding for roads and road safety is going to come under increasing pressure and work that we have requested Wiltshire Council to carry out in the past, such as erecting new signage, laying kerbs, additional white lines and surface repairs etc, will be harder to achieve. The same also applies to the Police whose road safety activities are likely to be curtailed because of their reduced budget. Therefore, in future we are going to need stronger justifications for work/activity that we consider is necessary. To increase the likelihood of future requests being implemented by either Wiltshire Council or the Police we need to collect data concerning incidents which occur on our local roads. This could include such things as traffic collisions, (particularly minor ones in which the Police are not involved), traffic jams caused by HGVs, damage caused by vehicles to property, verges, hedges or signs and near misses etc. (Although it may seem obvious, it is important to report near misses because there is a ratio between near misses and actual accidents, therefore recording near misses can assist in potentially forecasting a more serious incident.)

If we have documented evidence of a problem then we are more likely to get Wiltshire Council and the Police to take action to resolve it and therefore increase the safety on our roads. So if you consider an incident merits reporting then please contact me (details below) and I will log it on a master incident list. The incident details required are: date, time, location and brief description of the incident.

**Beatons:** "Do you mind if I take your photograph?" the man in **Beatons** asked. Apart from the usual concerns of hair, clothes, make-up, best side, I was flattered! The 'man' in question was Patrick Duffy who runs this super tea rooms and small bookshop. I had had a tip off about it already and when a friend rang to arrange to go out for lunch, this gave me an opportunity to try it. We arrived at the tea rooms just before twelve thirty on a Friday in late October and were lucky to get a table. The customers were very varied from the elderly to young mums, to the middle aged and late teens. The menu offered snacks such as baked potatoes or baguettes and other dishes such as the stew of the day. We chose delicious pork and red wine stew with a choice of bread or potatoes. The waitress was French and put an egg timer on our table when she started to serve us to show whether we were served within four or five minutes. To be honest, I was so busy people watching and gazing round this lovely place that I have no idea when it ran out. **Beatons** is a stylish and lively venue; the bookshop element is confined to a couple of very large bookcases but with an eclectic range of books, so you can just drop in for a coffee and browse. They serve cream teas, high tea and even breakfast – if you have time before you catch the London train. The tea room is situated at the bottom, right hand side of Tisbury High Street. There is plenty of parking on the road nearby. Please give it a try; I am sure you won't be disappointed. Opening times are from 8.00 am to 5.00 pm Monday to Saturday (closed on Tuesday); 9.00 am to 4.00 pm on Sundays. And look out for my photo in Salisbury Life!



**De-Liz Delicatessen:** About half way up the High Street, on the same side as Beatons, is this incredible delicatessen. I say 'incredible' because of the range of products on offer which is so extensive I feel that I could buy all my food-based Christmas presents here. ## Recipe of the Month

### Baked Custard with Toffee Apples

A sticky apple compote to eat with a simple baked pudding – you can substitute bananas for the apples if you like (serves 6)

#### Ingredients

For the custard:

- 5 egg yolks sliced
- 2 whole eggs
- 1 tbsp plain white flour
- 1 tbsp caster sugar
- 200 ml single cream
- 250 ml whole milk
- A few gratings of nutmeg

For the toffee apples:

- 4 seasonal British apples peeled, cored,
- 100 g butter
- 100 g golden syrup
- 100 g Demerara sugar

#### Method

Preheat oven to 200°C / gas mark 6 and butter an ovenproof dish (20 cm). Put the eggs and yolks in a bowl and beat in the flour and sugar until smooth. Heat the milk and cream together with the nutmeg, then whisk this into the eggs. Pour through a sieve into an ovenproof dish. Bake until set, slightly wobbly in the centre – about 20 – 25 minutes. Meanwhile prepare the toffee apples. Put all the ingredients into a pan and cook, allowing the mixture to bubble for about 5 minutes. When the apples are tender remove from the heat. Serve the baked custard immediately, with the apples on top and a little crème fraîche to lighten the flavour.



## Wine for Christmas

Start the day as you mean to go on with some fizz. All supermarkets and wine shops will have deals on Champagne in the run-up to Christmas but a less expensive alternative is either Cava or Prosecco, both available for well under £10. Add some peach puree to Prosecco to make a classic Bellini.

A traditional Christmas lunch probably calls for some classic wines but there really are no rules. A good match for roast turkey is a Chassagne Montrachet or Meursault, a richer creamier wine, alternatively a good value Chilean Chardonnay, ideally from the Casablanca region. If you prefer red, traditionalists would choose a Bordeaux but a good value alternative would be a Malbec from Argentina or a Tempranillo from La Mancha in Spain.



With Christmas pudding you can really go to town. It deserves a rich, raisiny dessert wine. If you're pushing the boat out then it would have to be Sauternes but there are some great stickies from all over the world now. Look out for Late Harvest Semillon or Riesling from Australia. But probably the best match ever for Christmas pudding or mince pies is a glass of Pedro Ximenez (PX) Sherry. Dark and voluptuous, it's just like liquidized mince pie itself. If you don't like mince pie or Christmas pud, just pour
