

Fairtrade Fortnight 27th February - 11th March Fairtrade - did you know?

60% of Fairtrade farmers and workers are based in Africa. Thanks to them we can buy Fairtrade cotton clothing, cosmetics, wine, fruit, coffee, tea, chocolate and much more...

Fairtrade is a thriving and growing campaign movement with over 500 Fairtrade Towns, over 600 Fairtrade Schools, over 140 Fairtrade Universities and over 6,700 Fairtrade Faith groups, including synagogues, mosques and Hindu temples.

19 million glasses of Fairtrade wine were enjoyed in the UK in 2010. You can buy Fairtrade wines in most major retailers and selected wine merchants. Or savour a glass in one of 137 Marston's pubs across the UK.

Three of the top chocolate brands in the UK are now Fairtrade. Look out for Kit Kats and Cadbury Dairy Milk bars with the FAIRTRADE Mark and from next summer, Maltesers too!

Chichester Cathedral is the world's first public building to display Fairtrade and Fairmined certified gold. In October 2011 a 3ft cockerel was gilded in Fairtrade certified gold and positioned atop the 270ft Cathedral spire.

Three out of 10 bananas sold in the UK are Fairtrade. All bananas in Sainsbury's are Fairtrade – they sell 1,200 Fairtrade bananas a minute adding up to a whopping 650 million a year.

Fairtrade and Fairmined certified gold was launched this year on Valentine's Day. The gold is mined by small scale artisanal miners in Colombia, Peru and Bolivia. Livia Firth wore Fairtrade gold to this year's Oscar ceremony in LA.

Model and TV presenter Lisa Butcher has just launched a range of Fairtrade cotton tee-shirts available from Tesco online.

Thousands of people up and down the country will be taking a Step for Fairtrade in 2012. They'll be baking cakes, holding coffee mornings, pledging to drink Fairtrade tea for a year, persuading their office to switch to Fairtrade beverages and taking a step to buy more Fairtrade cotton clothing. Last year more than 5,000 events took place around the UK.

Nature Notes

- 13 -

At last we have had some proper winter weather. Friday night's frost was definitely the hardest since last winter. Each evening we have lots of pheasants that come into roost on the top of the big beech hedge which surrounds the garden. Early Saturday morning when I was putting out the bird food and filling up the water bowls I noticed several hen pheasants with their backs still covered in frost. I have increased the food now that the temperature has dipped, but I'm trying not to over do it knowing that soon I will have to leave them to fend for themselves.

The number of goldfinches has increased as have the greenfinches. First thing this morning I noticed that the goldfinches were feeding at the front and the greenfinches were at the back of the house; probably to avoid arguments as the greenfinch is the more dominant bird. We're still getting a family of long-tailed tits pass through several times a day. They are continually on the move and use up so much energy that they need to feed constantly. Here they choose the fat balls and are often the first on them in the morning and the last to feed on them in the evening. We still have the male great spotted woodpecker coming to the peanuts on the shed. His plumage is beautiful; contrasting black and white with the bright flash of red on the back of the neck and under the tail. I've noticed more magpies around and coming into the garden; their harsh chattering call is unmistakable. They certainly clear the feeding stations, almost as well as when the sparrowhawk visits.

Several birds have been showing interest in the nesting boxes. At first I thought that they may just have been looking inside for insects etc. But recently I've seen a pair of tree sparrows going in and out of the box on the Scots pine (which was used last year by tree sparrows, perhaps the same pair?), and also a pair of blue tits looking at the box on the sycamore tree. I know tree sparrows will nest early if conditions are right (the young are fed on insects) and have several broods, but blue tits usually have one brood and rely mainly on caterpillars to feed their young, and if they try and nest too early they will be ahead of the caterpillar hatch and will be unsuccessful.

When I went for a walk this morning on the farm, I was pleased to see a large flock of lapwings feeding in amongst the sheep. There must have been, at a guess, about two hundred and when the lapwings flew up I could see some smaller birds with them which were starlings. As I walked on I saw some fieldfares, but it took me a moment to identify them as caught in the bright sunshine they looked bigger and their colours were more striking. Driving up and down the road I've seen lots of fieldfares and redwings where they have been attracted to the berries on the hawthorns in the roadside hedges. I have also been seeing bullfinches. I know it's a bullfinch by the size and the flash of white on the rump as it disappears deep into the hedge.

We had another hare in the garden on Boxing Day, but I feel that there are less around at the moment; often I would be able to count several

just looking out from the bathroom window. I've been hearing foxes calling at night, and on New Year's Day I spotted a fox crossing the field behind the farmhouse in broad daylight.



I expect that sort of behavior from an urban fox but not a country one, perhaps it

Wheelchair accessible vehicle - 12 -

MPV available for self-drive hire

Local communities' charity Community First is helping wheelchair users in Wiltshire to get out and about through the hire of a wheelchair accessible multi purpose vehicle (MPV). Based at Community First's offices in Devizes, the M.PV can be driven using an ordinary car licence and carry up to four passengers plus one wheelchair which can be wheeled straight into the vehicle. The vehicle is ideal for families who want to take a loved one out for the day but who could not do so ordinarily because the family car cannot accommodate a wheelchair user. The vehicle is also available on a self-drive hire basis to not-for-profit community organisations with or without wheelchair accessible transport needs (such as sports clubs, church groups, schools and groups for older people). The vehicle costs 15p per mile plus £4.70 per hour* to hire (*hourly charge only applicable when passengers are being carried). A charge for fuel used is also applicable. The Deverills and Crockerton Parish Rainfall report for 2011

The rainfall measurements from 5 different locations around the parish show that 2011 was the second 'dry year' running. In my opinion if our rainfall is below 30 inches that can be considered a 'dry year'. The average measurement from the 5 rain gauges shows 29.48 inches of rain fell on us during 2011. As usual Kingston Deverill recorded the greatest amount at 35.45 inches and at Manor Farm, Longbridge Deverill we recorded 26.805 inches. The 8.65 inch difference is quite normal, I have known it exceed 9 inches. The wettest month was June 5.32 inches, the driest April with only

0.50 inches. I wager 2012 will be wet, we are unlikely to have 3 dry years running.

The last 12 years I have recorded at Manor Farm, Longbridge Deverill as follows;

Therefore the average for the 12 years, from the year 2000 to end of 2011, at Longbridge Deverill is **34.46 inches**. I was reliably informed, *C* when I came to live here, that the rainfall average was 38 inches per annum for this the east part of the parish.



The fact that we have had two dry years running is clearly shown by the water level in the River Wylye and feeder streams, many of which have dried up. The river level is constantly reduced by the abstraction from the aquifers of this catchment area, by Wessex Water. The long term effect of the abstraction will take years to put right, and will not happen until Wessex Water can find another source of water to supply the increasing populations to the South and West of the

As the weather gets colder, it is a good time to consider what winter weather preparations you, your family and community may need to make. Below is the Government's list of the simple things you can do to help you, your family and community keep warm, healthy and safe through the cold weather and save money. Protecting your home

- Check that pipes are adequately lagged
- Check that you have ordered your winter heating fuel
- Check that you know where your stop tap is located

Switch, Insulate, Save campaign Health and well-being

Winter health advice from NHS Choices

•Check you have had your flu jab if you are aged 65 or over, pregnant, have certain medical conditions, live in a residential or nursing home, or are the main carer for an older or disabled person

Pathway safety Do not be put off clearing paths because you are afraid someone will get injured, people walking on snow and ice have a responsibility to be careful themselves. Clear the snow and ice early in the day, it is easier to move fresh snow, cover the path with salt before nightfall to stop it refreezing overnight. Pay extra attention to clearing snow and ice from steps and steep pathways - you might need to use more salt on these areas. Black ice increases the risk of injuries as it is invisible and very slippery. If you don't have enough salt, you can also use sand or ash. These won't stop the path icing over as effectively as salt, but will provide good grip underfoot. When shovelling snow, take care it doesn't block paths or drains. Offer to clear your neighbours' paths if they will have difficulty getting in and out of their home. Check elderly or disabled neighbours are alright in the cold weather. If you are worried about them, try contacting their relatives or friends, or if necessary the local council. Check who might need help



Recipe of the Month

Creamy Carrot Soup

Butter for frying 1 medium sized onion pealed and finely chopped 1 lb / half a kilo of carrots, peeled and chopped 1 large potato, peeled and diced 1 ½ pint / 900 ml chicken stock Salt & ground black pepper 1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley 1 teaspoon sugar Method



Melt a knob of butter in a saucepan. Add the vegetables, cover and cook gently for 5 minutes. Gradually stir in the chicken stock. Bring to the boil, add the seasoning, parsley and sugar, lower the heat and half cover. Simmer gently for 20 to 30 minutes or until the carrots are tender. Puree the soup in an electric blender or work through a sieve. Return to rinsed out pan. Reheat gently and adjust seasoning. Pour into warmed bowls for serving, swirl a spoonful of cream in each bowl and top with fried croutons. This makes a delicious winter

snack with hot toast or a starter for a dinner party.



Banana Fritters with Bitter Chocolate Sauce

by Gary Rhodes Ingredients

300ml (10floz) sweet cider 100g (4oz) plain flour plus a little extra for coating 25g (1oz) Fairtrade caster sugar 4 Fairtrade bananas, peeled vegetable oil for deep frying





Bitter chocolate sauce ingredients

300g (10oz) Fairtrade bitter dark chocolate, chopped

- 150g (5oz) unsalted butter
- 75ml (3fl oz) double cream

Method

To make the fritter batter, mix the cider, flour and sugar together. Cut each banana horizontally into 4 lengths and lightly flour each piece. Dip them into the batter, deep fry in hot oil for about 5 minutes until golden and crispy. Drain well.

To make the sauce, place all the ingredients together in a bowl over simmering water until the chocolate has completely melted. This sauce must be served warm.


To serve, place the fritters on a plate and pour the chocolate sauce next to them. Alternatively serve the chocolate sauce separately and decorate the fritters

Please bring your own drinks, snacks will be provided, donations welcome.


