

These are exciting times for the Cley Hill Benefice: the twin parishes of Deverills and Horningsham and our neighbours Corsley and Chapmanslade. Our Rector Norma Payne retired at the end of September. We had a wonderful last service for her at Longbridge Deverill and a beautiful buffet lunch and presentation at Horningsham village hall. Now we have to fill the large gap that Norma's well earned retirement has left.

We thought at first that it was just a question of preparing a 'Profile' of the Benefice and sending it to potential applicants and then choosing the right one for us. There is hard work in preparing the Profile. Robert Shuler and Charlie Thackway have led and many hands have helped. But there is a complication.

The Bishop has put us into 'Suspension'. This is not to punish us for something we have done or left undone. It is to enable the Diocese, if it so decides, to reorganise the various parishes in the area into new Benefices. The Bishop has given us this opportunity to improve things, if we can, both for our Clergy and for ourselves. A Benefice, for instance, which stretches as far and as wide as, currently, ours does is tough on our priest. It would have been impossible had it not been for Rev Di Britten's staunch support. Di is not paid for her work but always seems to give more of herself rather than less. But the time will one day come when Di will also seek *her* well-earned retirement.

So should we stay exactly as we are? Or should we instead be thinking of aligning ourselves with Mere, West Knoyle and Maiden Bradley or with Zeals, Kilmington, Stourton and Bourton or both, with Corsley and Chapmanslade staying with us and making a much bigger Benefice or aligning themselves with another parish with whom they would fit as well or better? It is much too early to answer those questions. We shall have to see what advantages we can expect if we re-align, advantages for everybody, that is, and not just for the Deverills. It will take time and effort to work out, with the good offices of the Diocese, whether it is better to make changes – or to stay exactly the same, as many wish.

Our immediate task is to find and appoint our new priest. The target timetable is: 7th and 14th February Advertisement placed in the Church Times; 18th and 19th March Interviews and Appointment.

When our new priest will actually be in post we do not yet know. That will depend on when he or she is free to move, perhaps there are children who need to complete a school term or some other factor. In the meantime we are enjoying the novelty and variety of visiting priests or, as at Horningham's Plough Sunday Service, the unexpected pleasure of managing without a priest and making a big success of a warm and happy occasion.

Nature Notes



Well we have certainly had some rain! According to an amateur weather recorder on Points West this evening it has been the wettest period for 50 years *(see also page 11). I don't think any of us would disagree with that! It has also been unseasonably mild. Last Wednesday when we had some gorgeous and welcome sunshine, I found a peacock butterfly near the pond in the garden. It had been sunning itself on a wooden platform but was in danger of falling into the water and then it started raining again! So it was in double need of rescuing. It was rather tatty, both wings were badly damaged but it was still alive. So I found a dry place in amongst some leaves in a big empty flower pot in the wood store where it could live out its days.

As the water levels rise in the rivers and streams, those animals and birds that live in or along them are severely affected. Bottom feeders, such as swans or ducks, can no longer reach down far enough, just keeping in one place against the flow becomes impossible. They will look elsewhere for food and I noticed the three swans normally on the river in the village feeding along the well filled ditch in front of the cress beds. Herons and little egrets unable to wade into the river from the bank will take to feeding out on the fields. It is not just the depth of water but the lack of clarity, the rush of water stirs up the bottom causing muddy cloudiness. A kingfisher will have no chance of seeing its prey or catching it. Normally we don't see a kingfisher on our pond at this time of year, but one had given up on the river (6th January) and came to try its luck out on our goldfish. Sadly our pond was fuller than usual and the fish had plenty of water and weed to hide in. I wonder how water voles manage, I hope they have a sixth sense when it comes to flooding.

I have noticed 2 bird species in the last month. Several times I have heard and then located a tree creeper. The sound is high pitched: a repeated "tsee". I always look for the silhouette as it climbs the tree trunk; they go up and/or along, never backwards. Their underneath is white and they have a fine, curved bill for probing the bark for insects. The tail is fairly long with stiff pointed feathers which they use for support in climbing. Once they have 'worked' one tree, starting at the base and moving upwards, they will fly to the next suitable tree and start again from the bottom up. They prefer trees with rough barks which harbour insects in between the cracks. The other bird I have noticed recently is the bullfinch. Again it was the call that alerted me to its presence. It has a soft "phee" call and tends to be secretive. Last year they were attracted to the buds on our neighbour's flowering cherry trees, and sure enough a pair of bullfinches have been feeding there in the morning sun. The male has a bright pinky red breast while the female's is a duller brown. Both have a jet black cap and white rump, obvious as the bird flies away. This is the best time of the year to learn bird calls when the trees are bare, you have a better chance to locate the bird making the sound. It takes time and patience but if I had not known the call of these 2 species they would have gone unnoticed by me.

An Old Agriculturist's Ramblings by Ian Woodcock - Part 6

Before I took over Shute Farm I naturally required some funds, so had to visit the bank manager to arrange an overdraft, accompanied by my father-in-law, and negotiate what I thought was a terrific noose around my neck. With the help also of an uncle of my wife we had sufficient funds to make a start.

By then the Shute staff had all handed in their notice, and also the shepherd at Ryehill who was in charge of 250 breeding ewes. One of the other men from Ryehill was then appointed shepherd. Not a bad thing to happen at Shute as I could then have a complete fresh start. I employed a cowman, relief milker/general farm worker and a tractor driver. I had purchased two grey Fergies complete with 3 furrow mounted plough, cultivator, harrows, buck rake and a mower.

The milking equipment being used was a Simplex Runway Recorder, very cumbersome. The four units were suspended on wheels on a girder, running down the length of the cowshed with a pipeline to take the milk to the dairy and cooled by an old fashioned surface cooler. This was achieved by passing the milk into two 10 gallon churns at a time. We were producing 8-10 churns a day. These were put onto a stand built to the height of a lorry bed to make it easier for the lorry driver to load. All this equipment required a lot of maintenance, washed up first and then put into a steam chest for sterilisation, the pipeline was steamed in situ. Steam was produced by a large coal fired boiler. This all required the attention of two men who did no outside work, only the dairy!

That was the first piece of equipment I disposed of. Instead I purchased a two unit Alfa-Laval second hand bucket plant. This meant that one man could cope with 40 cows single handed. Milk poured through a filter straight into churns taken into the dairy and cooled by an in-churn cooler, water fed through a pipe immersed to the depth of the churn, with this water flow designed to stir the milk slowly. This system was carried on for 8 years. I wanted to increase the cow numbers so purchased a Hosier 4 unit bail installed in the farmyard. This bail was raised up 18 inches so when the cows entered they had to mount this



step which enabled the cowman not to have to crouch to put the units on. As you can imagine this required a great deal of training of the cows to get them used to going up this step, but baited with tasty dairy feed nuts they soon got used to it. With the first calf heifers joining the herd we put them through the bail before they calved. This system enabled us to increase the herd to 70 cows.

The Deverills and Crockerton Rainfall figures for 2013

The report for the weather in this parish for 2013 must be looked at in two parts. The period February to end of August was surprisingly dry, and from September onwards increasingly wet. The summer months provided an abundance of fruit, and certain vegetables from our gardens. I have never known the orchards yield so much, in a complete contrast to 2012. The cereal harvest was one of the best I have ever experienced. However, all was not plentiful, and grass on our lawns was not cut as often as usual. The grazing and forage grass (to be converted into silage), for feeding cattle, suffered from the very cold spring and lack of rain. The rainfall measurements taken from 5 different sites throughout the Parish, and averaged out, reveals 34.17 inches fell during 2013. It is hard to believe, but that is 11.37 inches less than the Parish records for 2012, the wettest month being December 2013 when 7.036 inches were recorded, being the average taken from the 5 separate sites. August was the driest month with 0.708 inches recorded. I noted in my diary that there were 21 days without rain in July. Earlier, March, April and May were particularly cold with quite hard frosts up to April 30th. I recorded a slight frost at the end of August, which is earlier than usual. In this report last year, I bemoaned the decrease in certain bird species such as the lovely goldfinches. I am delighted to see that their numbers have almost recovered to where they were two years ago, likewise other visitors to our bird feeders.

Since the year 2000, here at Manor Farm, Longbridge Deverill, I have recorded the annual rainfall as follows. The 14 year average is 36.63 inches. There is always a difference between the Kingston and Longbridge rainfall records. In 2013 there was just over 3 inches more rain recorded at Kingston.

The records of the more recent bad weather.

As I write this report on January 14th 2014, we have hopefully just reached the end of a succession of storms and continuous wet weather. I thought you might be interested in the figures recorded from this recent bad spell. In the period 13th December to 14th January - 32 days, 10.75 inches of rain have fallen, 5.90 inches in December, followed by 4.85 inches in January. The barometer went down to 28.4 inches (an all-time low) just after midnight on Monday 23rd December. This heralded the worst of the storms, when we recorded 1.5 inches of rain in 24 hours.



However, we have suffered similar if not worse weather in years past. Those of us with long memories will recall the winters and subsequent floods in 1947 and 1962/3, the rainfall of September 1992 (when we recorded 4 inches in one afternoon), the awful summer of 1968 and again in 1977, the snows of December 1981, and again in January 1982.

Recipe of the month - Roast Chicken Thai Style.

Everyone likes roast chicken, but sometimes it is nice to do it a bit differently. Try this for an interesting take on your Sunday lunch.

Ingredients:

|-------------------------------|---------------------------------|
| 1 onion | 2 garlic cloves crushed |
| 3 lemon grass stalks | 1 red chilli |
| 5cm piece root ginger, grated | Juice of 2 limes |
| 1 tbs fish sauce | Handful of coriander with stems |
| 1 tbs brown sugar | 1 chicken, about 1.8 kg |



Method:

Blitz the marinade ingredients (everything except the chicken) together in a food processor and then rub it all over the chicken. Leave to marinate in the fridge for at least 4 hours. Roast at 180C/gas 4 for 1 hour and 15 minutes, or until cooked, basting occasionally. Deliciously different!
