The Rector writes:

In recent weeks, on a number of occasions, I have been present at meetings where there has been much talk of the future, and in particular about planning for five or ten years hence. It happens in the world of education and the way succession planning is encouraged. It happens in the business world, as companies plan for expansion and growth. It happens in the church as we face the challenges of mission and ministry, and falling vocations and increasing costs.

Figuratively gazing into a crystal ball and trying to assess what our situations might be in five years time isn't easy. However, it should be possible to prioritise the important issues and plan accordingly. We live in a constantly changing world. The present financial constraints impinge on everyone and most organisations to some degree. But other changes exist too. We are well aware of discussions about the future shape of the Health Service, about schools and their status, about pensions and the probable need to work longer before the luxury of retirement.

Within our respective communities, there are many different groups. Each plays an important part in our villages. Each contributes to the enrichment of our communities and the opportunities on offer. Just one good example is the 2011 Art Trail recently ended. What wonderful talents and skills are evident amongst us! I am aware also of the many ways volunteers contribute their time and skills to support individuals, organisations or projects which ultimately benefit the community as a whole. There may be 'gaps', but those could be the focus of community action in the future. I think that what we have and are able to enjoy is a cause for real celebration, and a strong place from which to look forward and consider how best to shape

From the Rector & Church Wardens

As Mr Micawber says in Charles Dickens' **David Copperfield**:

"Annual income twenty pounds, annual expenditure nineteen nineteen six, result happiness. Annual income twenty pounds, annual expenditure twenty pounds ought and six, result misery."

The funds of the Churches of the Deverills and Horningsham are in misery. Whilst there is still money in the PCC's General Fund, which covers day to day running costs, it has been progressively depleted in the last 3 years and our reserve is draining away. In the year ending December 2010, expenditure had exceeded income by £9,000, this followed a shortfall of £3,000 in both the previous 2 years (a total loss of £15,000).

This excess of payments over income is reducing our reserves and if the situation does not improve we will be broke by 2014.

In these hard economic times, giving to the Church has remained consistent over the past 3 years; the shortfall has resulted from a combination of increases in the insurance premiums by 1/3rd, investment income has reduced from £7,000 to less than £1,000 annually and running costs have risen in line with inflation.

The main expenses the Church must meet are; our Share (the contribution to the Diocese and Church of England, some £33,744, which we cannot influence) and secondly our Insurance premiums (£8,000 per annum). Insurance has been reviewed and reduced to the lowest acceptable level (the minimum cover). The Share is our contribution to the running of the Church of England and pays for our Rector (the stipend). The total cost for an incumbent in the Salisbury Diocese is £48,540 (this includes pension contribution, housing, council tax, water rates and statutory training).

The churches in our villages are valued historic buildings in their own right and are part of the fabric of our community, whether you are a regular attendee or only rely on the church for Baptisms, Marriages and Funerals, the church remains part of our heritage.

This is **NOT** just an appeal for a one off donation to shore up our churches, although it would be welcome. This is a call to increase our regular income and an appeal to:

Regular worshippers. To review their giving to ensure that it is updated (review standing orders or donation envelopes – how many years since you have changed to ensure giving is in line with increases in inflation?).

Other villagers and those who are occasional attendees. Help to support these historic buildings, by committing to a donation or a regular contribution towards the upkeep of our churches.

If we cannot afford our churches, we may not be able to retain them. Do you want to keep the churches in Longbridge, Brixton and Kingston? If so please contribute to their upkeep. King James Bible: 400th Anniversary – Comparative texts

The Testimony of John (St. John's Gospel 1: 19-23)

Wycliffe (1384) And this is the witnessing of Joon, whanne Jewis senten fro Jerusalem prestis and dekenes to hym, that thei schulden axe him, Who art thou? He knoulechide, and denyde not, and he knoulechide, For Y am not Crist. And thei axiden hym, What thane? Art thou Elie? And he seide, Y am not. Art thou a profete? And he answeride, Nay. Therfor thei seyden to hym, who art thou? Thar we yyue an answeere to these that senten us. What seist thou of thi self? He seide, y am the vois of a crier in deseert, dresse ye the weie of the Lord, as Ysaie, the prophete, seide.

Tyndale (1526) And this is the record of Jhon, when the Jewes sent prestes, and Levites from Jerusalem, to axe hym, what art thou? And he confessed, and denyed nott, and sayde plainly: I am not Christ. And they axed hym: what then? Arte thou Helias? And he sayde: I am not. Arte thou a prophet? And he answered noo. Then sayd they unto hym: what art thou? That we maye geve an answer to them that sent us? What sayest thou of thysilfe? He sayde: I am the voice of a cryar in the wilderness, make straight the waye of the lorde, as sayde the prophet Esayas.

King James (1611) And this is the record of John, when the Jews sent priests and Levites to Jerusalem to ask him, who art thou? And he confessed, and denied not; but confessed, I am not the Christ. And they asked him, What then? Art thou Elias? And he saith,, I am not. Art thou that prophet? And he answered, No. Then said they unto him., Who art thou? That we may give an answer to them that sent us. What sayest thou of thyself? He said, I am the voice of one crying in the wilderness, Make straight the way of the Lord.

NRSV (1989) This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?' He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed 'I am not the Messiah.' And they asked him, 'Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?' He said, 'I am the voice of one crying in the wilderness. Make straight the way of the Lord, as the prophet Isaiah said.'



The notable feature of the three earlier translations is their similarity. For Wycliffe's 'deacons' we have 'Levites', and 'confessed' replaces his 'knoulechide' ('acknowledged') but otherwise the form of expression remains the same. The dramatic effect of John's direct responses to his questioners 'and he said 'I am not'' and he answered, 'No'' is missing from the rather bland modern version.

Also of interest is Tyndale's use of the word 'plainly' in John's first denial. It not only adds succinct emphasis to what the Baptist has to say, but brings out yet again Tyndale's innate poetic instinct – commanding the listener to take in the story. It is unsurprising that Orlando Gibbons (1583 – 1623) chose the Tyndale version for his famous anthem 'This is the Record of John' – though of course he

Nature Notes

This morning I woke around about four to the sound of gentle rain accompanied by a blackbird duet, chattering swallows and a wren in the background. Later the house martins started 'talking' and a curlew called a beautiful burble rising and falling mimicking its flight; a good start to the day. The swallows and house martins are doing well. The house martin semi-detached development looks to be almost complete and has increased our nest number from 5 to 6. One swallow nest has already produced at least four young (fledged 4th June), and the east artificial house martin nest has young that are very close to flying. The swallows are extremely protective of 'their' garage and defend it avidly. A young blackbird found its way in there one day and they were going mad vocalising and trying to knock it to the floor away from their nests. They dive bomb us if we venture in or linger on the threshold. Once I heard them making a commotion and on investigation a female sparrowhawk flew out of the garage; a real threat and worthy of the noise. This was probably the same hawk that knocked itself out flying into the workshop the previous evening. We thought that it was 'a goner', when picked up it went very limp and seemed to shrink in size. But slowly it came back, when we were sure that it would fully recover, we stood it down on the ground outside and watched as she grew taller, more confident and got her bearings. 15 minutes after the knock out blow she flew away.



The tree sparrows in the box opposite the kitchen window have already fledged one brood (end of May), and after a 'spring clean' of the nest are on their second; by 9th June I could hear strong cheeping noises coming from the box once again. We have had young goldfinch being fed on the feeders. They lack the red on the head of the adult and could be clearly identified as 'youngsters' as they begged for food swaying from side to side and fluttering their wings, like a clockwork toy. We've also had young great spotted woodpecker; I had a good view of the adult female on the peanuts feeding a youngster hanging on the shed below her. The young have a red cap and only a little red under the tail (more pink than red).

The bluebells, azaleas and rhododendrons in the wood have gone over and now there is a wonderful display of foxgloves and a beautiful smell of honeysuckle. On the 1st June in the wood I was pleased to hear cuckoo, both female (bubbling call) and male (the familiar call). Hobbies are back nesting in the wood, and I have had a recent report of a goshawk. We've seen a male kestrel hunting hovering over the airstrip opposite the farm on a regular basis, one day even doing so in wind and rain, a sure sign that he has a family to feed somewhere.



At the end of May the grass was cut for silage on the farm exposing the hares to us once again. There are a good number and they often use the garden as a thoroughfare. One day a youngster was having a dust bath at the back of the house in an area normally reserved for pheasants! Last Saturday I caught sight of a weasel; it was only about 3 yards away and its reddish-brown coat con-

On the A350, driving from Shaftesbury to Blandford, you pass through the edge of the village of Iwerne Minster and at a bend in the A350 is The Talbot. At first glance you might be tempted to drive past because externally it is a rather unprepossessing building. My recommendation is that you don't. It really is quite a surprise when you get inside. The Talbot has been recently refurbished and has a very attractive dining area where they serve very good food. We went there one mid-week lunch time in May to have lunch and we were not alone, even mid week there were several other customers. The four people on the table next to us were obviously staying there as they were waxing lyrical about the breakfast they had enjoyed. They were certainly enjoying their lunch; the soup was so good that they mopped their plates clean! We had a very good lunch - I had the best ham I have had in a long time and in very pleasant surroundings. They pride themselves on serving local, seasonal food. As it was a bit chilly we ate in the dining room but there is an attractive out door eating area at the back. To my husband's delight (but not mine) wi-fi is available in the public rooms. Dogs and children are welcome. The pub is a Hall and Woodhouse brewery and serves a good selection of Dorset beers and also has a reasonable wine list. Check out their website; you can also find them in Alastair Sawday's Special Places to Stay. The village of Iwerne Minster is also worth a visit - it has an excellent butcher and a well-stocked village shop.

Recipe - Scotch Eggs

Sponsored by Maiden Bradley Community Shop (844206). We have introduced new lines recently and Andrew Barclay is also supplying the shop with meat. Come and try us. We always welcome suggestions.

Ingredients

1 lb (500 gms) pork sausage meat	1 small onion, peeled and finely chopped
1 tspn dried mixed herbs	4 eggs, hard boiled
1 egg, beaten	Approx. 6 oz (175 gms) dried breadcrumbs

Oil for deep fat frying

Method

Put the sausage meat, onion and mixed herbs together in a bowl and mix well. Divide the mixture into four and press firmly around the hard boiled eggs. Roll in flour, then dip in the beaten egg. Coat with the breadcrumbs, making sure the sausage meat is evenly covered. Chill in fridge for at least one hour before frying. Heat oil gently in deep fat fryer until hot enough to turn a stale bread cube golden in 20 to 30 seconds (180-190 C / 350-375 F on deep fat frying thermometer). Fry the scotch eggs 2 at a time for about 10 minutes. until crisp and golden brown. Drain on kitchen


