

The Rector writes:

I have a host of books on the shelves that line my study walls.

Some I have read cover to cover. Some I have only dipped into.

Some I have read various chapters when I have been studying.

Most that come into the latter category I carefully and intentionally keep so that when I am able, I can read what, to date, remains unread!

In a moment or two of relaxation the other day, I picked up one part-read volume*, and was immediately taken with the author's views about how language changes as culture changes. He gives some very telling examples of new idioms which have come into regular usage, all to do with the words **life**, **live** and **living**. Such familiar phrases trip off the tongue so easily but behind each there is great depth of meaning if we pause to consider it.

We all need an *aim in life*, and most of us have *to face up to life's challenges*. Some of us are able *to take life as it comes* while others worry about *where life is taking us*. Hopefully, we all *learn the lessons of life*, and may have decided to *live life one day at a time*. When filled with zeal, we have a *mission in life*: we can't sit back and do nothing because *today is the first day of the rest of our life*. Some of us are blessed with being able to look *on the bright side of life*; while others wonder *what else life can throw at us*. We are increasingly aware of *our quality of life*, *our lifestyle*, of *the joys of life* and *the mystery of life*. I could go on It is interesting that in all these phrases there is no mention of God.

In the baptism service, we say as Christians that we believe and trust in God the Father who made all things, in the Son who redeemed the world, and in the Holy Spirit who gives life to the people of God. I hope that still has meaning for us. However, realistically, the changes in language and emphasis reflect the cultural climate of today. They do not change essential truths.

Francesca Elloway CMS Partner

Democratic Republic of Congo

Francesca sends greetings to all her supporters in her January Newsletter. The new nursing college was opened amidst a joyful service in the cathedral and eighty two students have started the first year. Australian volunteers have been installing solar lighting so that the students can study in the evenings.

The palliative care work is also encouraging with home visits beginning by a well qualified team who enjoy this sphere of their work. We have begun work on a new building for palliative care and counselling work and a core group of six people are visiting Uganda Hospice in Kampala for a week to see the work there.

We now have small dental clinics at Mahagi and Aru, partly funded with money raised by an Australian dentist who is training students to take on this work here.

Sadly Robert, the fourteen year old son of Yobu who works in Francesca's house and garden, died of pneumonic plague at the health centre in Aru 24 hours after he was admitted. He had been visiting another village and must have been bitten by an infected rat flea, although Francesca and her team did not know that until after he had died. As soon as it was realised what the cause had been, prophylactic antibiotics were given to all those at risk. Francesca was so sad that she had not been able to save Robert's life. Please remember Yobu and his family and Francesca and her team in your prayers.

Foodbank, patron Andrew Murrison MP, now has a collection point at Longbridge Deverill Church for the Warminster and District Foodbank. This is a registered charity, networking with The Trussell Trust who help over 80 Foodbanks across the country. Food donated by the community is banked, to be drawn on by people in crisis. Packs contain free emergency food for three days (10 bal-


on by people in crisis. Packs contain free emergency food for three days (10 balanced meals); the selection has been developed with support from the Salisbury District Hospital Nutritional and Dietetics Department, part of the South Wiltshire Primary Care Trust.

A good system of distribution has been developed. Food is made available following a referral from registered Care Professionals such as Social Services, Health Visitors, Mental Health Teams, Church Pastoral Workers, schools and others working in the front line of poverty. The client in crisis may be given a voucher to exchange for a food pack from the distribution centre. Emergency packs may also be given directly to individuals or families by care professionals when the store is shut.

The need is for tinned meat, fish, fruit and vegetables; pasta and rice; longlife milk and fruit juice; cereals; tea, coffee etc. A more detailed 'shopping list' is available in Longbridge Deverill Church where donations may be left in a basket inside the door. Nature Notes

On the morning of the 24th January I saw two hares boxing; a sure sign of spring, probably a bit premature but great to see. (Hares will breed all year round, but the activity is concentrated in the spring.)



The winter migrants are still with us. Recently we have had very large flocks on the field behind the house, mainly fieldfares but with some redwing and starling. Starlings have been flocking in good numbers in the village. The other evening there must have been around two hundred putting on a display finally descending into the overgrown scrub next to the river behind the garage. The numbers on the Somerset Levels reach into the millions with the bulk of these coming from Northern Europe or Russia. I had a report of waxwings in a Crockerton garden at the be-

ginning of February, and I have heard of the odd bird in Longbridge. It won't be long before all the winter migrants start to make their way back to the continent.

On still evenings I have heard the tawny owls calling. They have been noticeably quiet during the cold winter that we have had and will be

keen to pair, mate and breed as soon as possible. They are normally an early breeder, as are the ravens, but this winter has definitely set things back. I have only heard foxes calling on one or two evenings; it is the vixen which makes the very eerie shrill call and the dog that makes the deeper bark. The badgers seem not to have been affected by the cold; this I suppose is logical as they are under ground for the best part of the time during the winter. They go into a deep sleep, not a true hibernation, and only venture out when hunger or thirst forces them to do so. The setts up the lane are showing signs of activity; new bedding is being brought in ready for the birth of the cubs any day now, in fact they may have already arrived. It will be April before the cubs go above ground for the first time.

One last thing to mention; there is a very pale buzzard around here that I have mistaken several times for a large gull until I have got the binoculars out. It is a really handsome bird, but I wonder if its colour will pose problems when finding a mate. Nature will often isolate the unusual. I am not sure if it is a male or female. In birds of prey, the female is the bigger bird. The other day, I did see it with two other darker coloured buzzards feeding on the ground in the field just behind the

Community First Responders

For a person suffering a heart attack, stroke or other similar emergency, receiving clinical help in the first few minutes can literally be the difference between life and death. Community First Responders (CFRs) are volunteers who respond within a three-mile radius of their home or place of work to patients with immediately life-threatening medical emergencies. They are NOT an alternative to an ambulance but are a vital part of our emergency care services, able to provide the essential care and treatment for a patient in those first minutes following an emergency while the professional ambulance crew is on the way. CFRs attend particular types of medical emergencies where it is essential for the patient to receive immediate life-saving care including cardiac arrest, chest pain, breathing difficulties, unconsciousness, fitting, stroke. CFRs are not sent to road traffic collisions, other incidents involving traumatic injuries or incidents involving children.

We are keen to set up a CFR group in the Deverill Valley. Currently there is only one — me! If you think you could take on this incredibly worthwhile and practical community role please contact me and I will let you have further details.

Dogs - Friendly Warning

Currently reports of dog attacks are increasing within the Warminster Rural area, many of these are due to lack of control by the owner/dog walker. People out walking dogs need to take full responsibility for the dogs' actions and must have full control of the dog at all times, failing to do so means that you are potentially committing offences which can lead to prosecution and worse case scenario - destruction of the dog. A dog simply chasing sheep around a field can cause so much stress to the point that they can miscarry and due to their natural instincts to flock together at such times, this can cause a lamb to lose its mother, these are just a couple of the effects. Any farmer has permission to 'shoot on site' if a dog is caught worrying their sheep and dogs in this area have been shot. If an incident occurs involving your dog or a dog under your control then you are advised to report it to the police immedi-

The Grosvenor Hotel, Shaftesbury (01747 850580; www.hotelgrosvenor.com)

The Grosvenor is a rather swish hotel in the centre of Shaftesbury. Styled as a 'boutique' hotel, it is decorated in strong colours with very modern furnishings. It is something of a surprise to find in Shaftesbury but seems to be proving very popular. We met up with a business colleague for lunch one very damp Tuesday in February and were surprised to find about twenty other people having lunch in the restaurant. However, once we had tasted the food we could understand why: we had an excellent two course lunch for £9.50 per head. The cuisine is described on their website as 'traditional European food for the modern palate'! All I can say is that the seared salmon I had was wonderful and my husband was delighted with his belly pork. You can just pop into the bar for a snack, or for morning coffee or afternoon tea.

There is a pleasant lounge area with daily newspapers and an outside courtyard with doors opening onto it from the bar; sadly the weather didn't allow us to explore that area. If you are in Shaftesbury looking for somewhere pleasant and relaxing to eat, I heartily recommend the Grosvenor.

The White Lion at Bourton (01747 840866; www.whitelionbourton.co.uk)

I feel I must put in another plug for the White Lion. We went to their opera night on 11th February and it was excellent. For £25 per head we had a superb meal on an Italian theme (but not a pizza or pasta dish in sight!) and were entertained by a bassbaritone and a soprano with arias from various operas. The food was very special and inventive and the ambience relaxed and convivial. The two singers and their pianist were very professional and provided a mixture of high drama and whimsy in their selection. You can look on there website for other treats in store. I know there is a wine and cheese tasting on 10th March and also a night of traditional jazz is on the cards. They are not always quick to advertise some of these events so it may be best to telephone them and ask what is coming up. We had a splendid evening, I applaud a pub that is trying (and in the case of the opera evening certainly succeeding) to do something different and also serve some very good food.


