At this time of year, the leaves fall from the trees and the weather grows colder. For the ancients Celts, the first day of November marked the end of summer and the beginning of winter. In sympathy with the changing seasons the church's calendar moves into a new period of reflection and

remembrance. All Saints Sunday heralds this season of remembrance in our churches at the beginning of November, as the Church celebrates the lives of the saints and martyrs, known and unknown, through Christian history. St Columba is one of the many Celtic saints whose name has inspired, and continues to inspire, Christian pilgrims from across the world to make the long journey to visit the small island of lona in the Inner Hebrides off the Ross of Mull on the western coast of Scotland.

Neil and I have just returned from a pilgrimage to this small and beautiful island, known to some as a thin place, a place where it is said 'heaven and earth come together'. Here we have not only enjoyed the company of other pilgrims but have had the opportunity to take time, to stop and to reflect, and to marvel, at the vision of those early saints who set out (in coracles) in faith, with the sole purpose of spreading the gospel message, creating Christian communities and sharing God's love in faith and action. Their legacy has developed and grown with each generation, through the rhythm and discipline of a prayerful of life, still adopted by the lona community of today. Iona gives the people time to really think about things, to go off walking, to sit by a beach, to look at the beauty and just reflect on who and what they are in God's creation. On the last day, we walked down to St. Columba's Bay, on the southern tip of the island, where the saint and his monks are said to have landed. It is on this beach that pilgrims are encouraged to choose two stones. The first they throw into the waves, to symbolise something they wish to leave behind; the other they take with them, to represent a new beginning.

The Saints we will celebrate in our services are not only those whose names are to be found on the plaques of cathedral walls and churches but are also ordinary people who have inspired and continue to inspire those who come after them - those men and women of faith who put risk aside as they step out into the world in the name of Jesus Christ; those who aren't afraid to cross vast oceans in coracles!






#### **Nature Notes**

Driving across to Westbury yesterday afternoon with the bright sun shining on the fields and hedgerows picking out the gorgeous colours, it made me realise that we are now well into autumn. The season of mists and mellow fruitfulness as the poet John Keats described it. It is definitely a fruitful autumn with lots of berries and nuts in the hedgerows; a bountiful nature's harvest. With so much food available naturally I have not been feeding the birds in the garden much, waiting until they really need help. Also about a month ago I noticed that several birds were looking poorly on the feeders; first it was a greenfinch, then a young goldfinch and then a chaffinch. I suspected that they were suffering from trichomoniasis, so in order to prevent further spread of the infection I stopped feeding seed (no more mess mix and sunflower hearts which was attracting the finches). It seems to have worked but time will tell. The protozoan Trichomonas gallinae is the causal agent, and it was first recognized as causing a disease in British finches in 2005. Greenfinches seem particularly sensitive and always seem to be the first to succumb in an outbreak acting as an indicator. In fact the disease has killed a lot of greenfinches and it is only in the last few years that their numbers have started to pick up. The disease also affects pigeons and doves; in fact they seem to act as a reservoir for the protozoan. In pigeons it is commonly called canker. Turkeys, chickens and raptors can also be infected, and I can remember pheasants being affected at the farm.

The heron and kingfisher are still regular visitors to the pond. We have still a few fish left but they keep well hidden most of the time! Grey wagtails come to the pond daily balancing on the water-lily leaves and darting along the stone slabs along the edge, seeking out insects, continually bobbing up and down as they do so. On sunny, warmer days we still see the odd emperor dragonfly. The dropping temperatures are prompting some insects to look for safe, warm (in relation to outdoors) and dry places to hibernate. I have already removed a queen wasp and a peacock butterfly from the garage and Clive a small tortoiseshell, all put outside as they were very active and were in danger of harming themselves, or us, reference the wasp!

I have noticed quite a lot of mistle thrushes around. It is our biggest thrush and is very bold with a loud chattering 'football-rattle' call. Soon we will get an influx of fieldfares migrating from Scandinavia together with redwings. I expect that some are already here though I have yet to see or hear any. The fieldfares are the birds with the harsh 'cha-cha-chack' call and the redwings have a penetrating 'tseep' call which can be heard overhead on a cold clear night. I have noticed ravens flying over regularly each evening calling and sometimes giving a quick aerial display tumbling towards the ground and then soaring upwards. They will be going to a communal overnight roost and, judging by their flight path, probably in Longleat woods. Starling flocks are becoming more noticeable building up in numbers ready to perform their aerial displays; murmurations.

Finally on the 16th and 23rd September, both Mondays just after lunch-time we

#### An Old Agriculturist's Ramblings - Part 3

Following on from my last contribution, I was enjoying working for Col. Jack very much, but was anxious to become boss of my own acres. My wife was of the same opinion, as she, being a farmer's daughter was missing the benefits of a large farmhouse complete with Esse cooker. She had to put up with a small brand new cottage, which had been built post-war when the restrictions imposed were that only £1,000 could be spent on building it. So whenever the opportunity arose of a farm coming up for a new tenant my ears pricked up and with the added help of a very kind father-in-law, we were off viewing at the first opportunity. This became fairly often and Col. Jack was not happy about my frequent requests for a day off. Eventually I was called into the office for a discussion about my future. A proposition was put to me, if I guaranteed to stay in my present position for five years my salary would be doubled, I would then be able to visit potential farms to rent. I stated that I would consider the proposal, but would need to discuss it with my wife, and would come back to him with my opinion. I returned to him to say that I would minimum of three years, to which he replied that I could not expect to have my salary doubled! I agreed and he said he would accept my three years and I would receive a £755 increase, which I accepted. We shook hands as no contracts employment were needed in those days, a gentleman's word was his bond.

Unfortunately, when two years and six months had passed, I had a visit from my brother-in-law who farmed in Horningsham. He had news that Mr Algar, who was then agent to Lord Bath, who owned Ryehill Farm and tenanted Shute Farm, was relinquishing the tenancy of Shute and disposing of his manager. The proposition was put to me that I could have the tenancy of Shute with the proviso that I had to manage Ryehill Farm as well. He wanted me to take over the two farms as manager on June 21st, following which on September 29th the two would be split and I would farm Shute on my own and continue to manage Ryehill for him. Unfortunately, I could not discuss this with Col. Jack as he was away in Austria on a farming visit. When he returned on a Saturday I contacted him and stated that I wanted to see him rather urgently. We arranged that I would go and walk over the farm on the Sunday after lunch when I could 'spill the beans', which meant I was abandoning him with 1,000 acres of harvesting to be gathered! We set off, me with fear and trepidation as I gave him the news. He stopped dead in his tracks, looked me straight in the face and said "Ian, you'll never get another opportunity like this, I will release you from our agreement". This shows what an understanding gentleman he was. The next hurdle to jump was to find a replacement for me, he advertised for someone to be his foreman. There were a number of potential applicants we duly interviewed. Unfortunately we selected the wrong one – he only lasted for three months.

On the twenty-first of June 1956 we departed from Lower Pertwood after taking all the staff to The George at Longbridge Deverill for a farewell drink and took up residence at Shute Farm.

## Recipe of the month - Mushroom and Lentil Lasagne Sponsored by Maiden Bradley Community Shop

During the preparation of these recipes we seem to have neglected the vegetarians so here is something to cheer them up, but good for everyone else too! **Ingredients:** 

2 tablespoons of any oil 50g cheese, grated 1 onion, chopped For the Cheese sauce:

2 garlic cloves, chopped 1 tablespoon soft margarine 250g mushrooms, chopped finely 1 tablespoon wholemeal flour

2 tablespoons tomato puree 300ml milk

1 tablespoon red pesto a pinch of dry mustard

400g can chopped tomatoes 125g vegetarian hard cheese

400g can green lentils, drained salt and pepper

125g no-cooking-required-lasagne sheets

*Method:* Pre-heat the oven to gas martk6/200C/400F

Heat 1 tablespoon of the oil in a saucepan and fry the onion and garlic for 5 minutes. Add the rest of the oil and mushrooms and fry for another 5 minutes. Add the tomato puree, red pesto, chopped tomatoes and lentils. Simmer for 5 minutes.

Meanwhile make the cheese sauce: first melt the margarine in a small sauce-pan. Remove from the heat and mix in the flour and a little of the milk. Return to the heat and slowly add the rest of the milk whilst stirring. Season with dry mustard and salt and pepper. Cook over a gentle heat for a minute and then add half the cheese. Put a layer of the mushroom mixture in a lasagne dish, then cover with half the lasagne sheets and half of the sauce. Continue with the rest of the mushroom mixture, lasagne sheets and sauce. Sprinkle with the remaining cheese and bake in the pre-heated oven for 45 minutes.

## **Broadband in the Upper Deverills**

As regular readers will know Wiltshire Council has selected BT to provide broadband upgrading throughout the county. Under this programme a minimum of 91% of all premises should be able to access superfast broadband by 2016. This is defined as a download speed of a minimum of 24 megabits per second (mbps). By then the remaining 9% of premises will be provided with a minimum speed of 2mbps. (Currently speeds in the Upper Deverills range from around 0.3 to 1.5mbps). So whilst this may be a small improvement and probably provide greater reliability, unlike superfast broadband it will not enable video streaming, easier transmission of large files, etc.

Under Wiltshire's plans Brixton Deverill will benefit from Faster Broadband and the target for delivery is late 2014. More general information about Wiltshire's plans can be found at www.wiltshireonline.org/broadband-update.

In July's Parish News we reported that we had submitted a grant application to the Government's Rural Community Broadband Fund (RCBF) which has limited funds to assist a few communities who will not be getting Faster Broadband to get that provided. We particularly emphasised the importance of upgrading broadband to help sustain our communities and the fact that Kingston and Monkton Deverill would be disadvantaged compared to other local villages.

At the end of September we heard that our 'Expression of Interest' had successfully passed the first hurdle. We now have to do much more work to take what is only a preliminary assessment to the next stage. At the time of writing this note there are many issues that would need to be resolved if we are ultimately to be successful. Amongst these is the need to produce firm evidence that sufficient numbers of households would sign up to Faster Broadband; assisting in securing wayleaves and sites for the green roadside cabinets that would be required; and securing some additional funding as the grant may only cover 75% of the capital cost. It is anticipated that we will need to contact households in the two villages to get further information during the next couple of months so please respond. If there is anyone who would be interested in assisting the Broadband Action Group with this project please get in touch.
