

Anniversary Celebrations of Songs of Praise. The review of this long running programme, its presenters and locations gave the opportunity to indulge in mild nostalgia. At the same time, it was a wonderful 'social'

comment, as incidentally it reminded us of fashions and styles of days long past.

For many people, hymns are important, often being associated with particular times or events in their lives. There are, of course, many hymns which stand the test of time, and which are as popular now as they were fifty years ago. Modern music and words have enriched our hymnody, and many modern hymns have been made popular by being brought into our homes by Songs of Praise as much as by their use in our churches. For some Christians, the words of hymns are formative of faith. We might say they enable the working out of some sort of theology.


Of course, the hymn tunes themselves are vitally important too. Singing well known words to an unfamiliar tune is the source of great disappointment. We somehow feel cheated!

I sometimes worry that children and young people miss out on this very important aspect of our heritage, because traditional hymns are not taught in schools in the way that once they were. When situations occur that invite a choice of hymns, the repertoire from which choices may be made is very limited. That always seems to me to be a shame, when there is such a wealth of wonderful hymns available.

I wonder if you have a favourite hymn. What is it that makes it special to you? With what is it particularly associated in your mind? If your favourite doesn't figure among the hymns we sing in church, do let me know. I might just be able to rectify the omission! In the meantime, keep singing (even if it is only

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Christian Aid

Thank you very much for all your hard work in the Warminster group which raised **£6,074.09** during Christian Aid Week. This is a wonderful result. Our thanks to everyone involved.

This year's Christian Aid Week focused on Nicaragua, Latin America's poorest country after Haiti. Our partner Soppexcca's work is bringing transformational change within communities of poor small scale coffee farmers in the Jinotega region of rural Nicaragua. Soppexcca is a business and a cooperative owned by the coffee farmers who supply it, meaning every business decision taken is with the welfare of the cooperative members in mind, they also work towards bringing justice to business practices throughout the country.

Gustavo Adolfo, a coffee farmer, is one of the founding members of the Los Alpes cooperative, which has been selling coffee to Soppexcca for over a decade. Loans from Soppexcca have allowed him to expand his farm, build a small environmentally sound coffee processing plant and produce organic coffee which is exported internationally. He is illiterate but shares Christian Aid's hope for a better future without poverty wanting the children in his village to be educated. With no school in his community, children attended lessons in his front yard. Eventually, after years struggling to access resources from the government, Gustavo and other community members built the school with their own hands using materials donated by Soppexcca sourced from international donors, like Christian Aid supporters.

At Christian Aid, we believe poverty is an outrage against humanity, robbing people of dignity, freedom and hope; of power over their own lives. Your support, and that of all those volunteers who fundraised for us in May, means that we can enable more people like Gustavo to find lasting pathways out of poverty.

Ride and Stride

Congratulations to Richard Munro, Nigel Poole, Robert and Trish Shuler who represented the parish by cycling and walking. Together they have raised more than **£474** for the Wiltshire Historic Churches Trust. Much of this was gift aided which means an extra 25p in the pound. Half the amount raised will come back to our parish for the upkeep of our four churches. The rest will provide grants for our county's beautiful churches. Thank you to all the generous sponsors.

Macmillan Cancer Support

A Macmillan coffee morning was held in The Marsh in September. A total of **£400** was sent to the charity, much of which was gift-aided. We were blessed with a warm and sunny day, which made a huge difference, and along with the generous support of those who attended, contributed to the success of the morning.

Save the Children

Cream Teas and Garden open events held at Mill Farm House, Hill Deverill on the last Sunday of the months April to September raised a wonder total of **£2,353.65** for Save the Children. Thank you to Val Dale and her family for their generous hospitality and to all who came along and supported us.

Nature Notes

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With the temperature remaining unseasonably warm there have been lots of flies around. They have been especially attracted to the front of the house, which is in full sun and painted white, and to the greenhouse.

Last night was a little cooler, I think there may be less flies today but still noticeable. All insects have been enjoying the prolonged higher temperature, we had lots of ladybirds flying about recently. Some of the ladybirds have come inside to hibernate over winter and where they have settled along a window frame which was partially open, they will have to be removed or they will get squashed. When I went out into the vegetable patch this morning I disturbed a host of insects which were feeding on some ivy flowers, they are a very important source of nectar at this time of the year. The Mahonia bush was also humming with insects, many of them were honey bees.

The vast number of insects around is great for the birds and together with all the fruit and seeds at this time of the year they are not looking for food from us. I have cut down the food to just peanuts and fat balls which much of the time are not being eaten. There was a male great spotted woodpecker on the peanuts at the rear of the house yesterday morning, the first in ages. Tits, house sparrows, robins and greenfinches have been feeding occasionally. Watching from the kitchen window I can see all the birds finding food naturally in the garden, in the trees or on the ground. I saw a family of long-tailed tits working their way through the branches of the apple tree picking off insects as they went. Blue tits, great tits, a robin and a wren were doing the same on the acacia tree. Under the apple tree a blackbird was digging around in the soil for worms and pecking at the fallen fruit.

I have noticed a few changes in the birds recently. The wrens have become more vocal and thereby visible. They are emitting an alarm call which I assume to be something to do with territory. There is a wren that appears to live in the winter jasmine along the wall of the patio and he regularly struts his stuff in the morning when I am drinking my morning cup of tea. I have heard pied wagtails near the farmhouse again; they seem to go out into the farmyard to breed during the spring/summer and don't visit us again until the autumn. They could be feasting on all the flies that the front of the house seems to have attracted. At dusk the blackbirds are now very noisy, I think that is to do with territorial disputes and/or roosting sites. The tawny owls are very vocal especially on still clear nights when the hunting is good and the sound travels. They are pairing up and settling territories as they are very early breeders in the next season. As yet I have not heard the 'steep' call of redwings, continental migrants, or seen any fieldfares, both should be here soon.

Last Wednesday I had a bit of a crisis early morning. A squab (a young pigeon) had managed to get itself stuck between the oil tank and the wall of the house around the back. I managed to wedge a piece of wood underneath the squab to stop it falling down any further. Clive fetched a ladder and I could then just about reach the poor bird and free it. A quick check over revealed that apart from grazes

It may seem strange that someone who has spent 31 years visiting on average 5 pubs a day has taken 6 years to write his first report for the Parish News! Having been responsible for appointing (and occasionally dismissing) managers and tenants, I know only too well that the key element in the success or failure of any Public House is the Licensee. Since arriving in the valley I have listened to friends, neighbours and complete strangers who have responded to my question, "Know a good pub?" with "The new people have ruined"

We revisited The Angel recently and were much impressed. The layout is much the same as before but outside it has been painted, flower baskets tidied up and signage cleaned. A good omen! The menu is full of innovation and interest. For dinner we had the Wiener Schnitzel – what a treat – veal escalope, fried egg and chives, green beans and chips @ £17. We could have had a 'sharing board' of Camembert fondue or mezze or braised and rolled shoulder of Heytesbury venison (when did you last see a deer by the A36? Oh, never mind!). There are also specials including Black Pudding and smoked bacon salad with poached guinea fowl eggs @ £8, which Julia said was delicious, or crab and king prawn fish cake @ £8. The lunchtime-only menu includes eggs Benedict £5.50/£10 – delicious, or eggs Royale £6.50/£11. There are many other such dishes. The staff are polite and helpful, the parking plentiful and the natives were friendly – what more could you want?

Recipe - Custard Tart

Sponsored by Maiden Bradley Community Shop (844206) Ingredients

- For the Pastry: 100g/4oz plain flour Pinch of salt 1 x 15ml/1tblspn caster sugar 50g/2oz butter 1-2 x 15ml/1-2 tblspns water Method
- For the custard: 2 eggs, beaten 25g/1 oz caster sugar 300 ml /half pt milk 1 x 2.5ml/half tspn Nutmeg (Bargain price at MB shop!)

Prepare the pastry, sift the flour and salt into a mixing bowl, stir in the sugar. Add the butter in pieces and rub into the flour until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs. Gradually stir in enough water to form a soft dough, form into a ball and wrap in foil, chill in the fridge for 30 minutes. Roll out the chilled dough on a floured board to a circle large enough to line a 15.5cm/7" flan dish, place on a baking sheet. Prick the bottom of the dough, then chill for a further 15 minutes.

Meanwhile make the custard. Put the eggs and sugar into a mixing bowl and beat in the milk until the sugar dissolves. Strain the custard into the chilled flan case. Sprinkle with nutmeg and bake in a fairly hot oven (200C/400F or Gas Mark 6) for 10 minutes. Lower the heat to moderate (180C/350F of Gas Mark 4) and bake for a further 20-25 mins or until the pastry is golden and the filling is set.


