

Nature Notes

We've certainly had some very cold nights in the last month and even the day time temperatures have struggled to keep above freezing. The bird food has disappeared faster and I've found myself topping it up more than I had intended to. It's not just them eating more because of the cold. I'm sure that there have been more birds present at the feeders at one time. I've not seen any different birds, just the same species but in greater numbers. Over the last few days the weather has warmed up considerably and thankfully food consumption has gone down. During the very cold snap I struggled to keep the birds' water baths icefree. Water is very important not just for drinking but for bathing to keep feathers in tiptop condition so they can provide the vital insulation necessary to ward off the cold. Several times when I had just provided fresh water, often having broken a layer of ice, birds were soon in drinking and bathing. It made me feel that the effort was very worthwhile.

I mentioned last time that I hadn't seen so many hares. Well I can report that thankfully I've seen a lot more since then. On Sunday afternoon I walked to Shearwater and on the fields just at the back of the house I counted at least ten. I can never get enough of hares - they are just so gorgeous; such a lovely colour, wonderfully camouflaged, and quite magical. On the same walk I saw lots of birds feeding on the ground; a mixture of fieldfares, redwings, starlings, lapwings and golden plovers. The ground had softened, making digging with beaks easier and the warmth had stirred insects and grubs into action and the birds were quick to feed after the cold hard conditions of the previous week. It was lovely to hear the call of the lapwing..."pee-wit", in fact one of its other names is peewit, the other green plover. But I have to admit the golden plover was the real "star

of the show" with its plaintive, haunting "kleeep" call. The golden plover breeds on upland moor, Northern Britain, and comes down to the south for the winter where it finds food more easily. It is smaller and daintier than a lapwing. Lapwings are with us all year round. They have declined in numbers, but I was pleased to see that at least on the farm here this year they are doing well. The lapwing is the symbol of the Wiltshire Wildlife Trust.



The days are definitely getting longer, the birds are waking earlier in the morning and they are even starting to sing a short dawn chorus. It is lovely to have the lighter evenings, and the late sunlight on the hills opposite this evening was beautiful, honey gold and pink hues of light. There are signs of movement in the hedgerows; white carpets of snowdrops, the catkins on the hazel are showing up well, the velvet grey buds of the willow (pussy willow) are just lovely to touch, and the sticky buds on the horse chestnut. One of our camellia bushes had some wonderful pink blooms before the hard frosts; sadly now they are all brown, but there may be a second show of flowers to come. This weekend it is due to get colder, so despite it feeling as if spring is just around the corner, we

Business and Broadband in the Upper Deverills

Since our update in October we have continued to raise the need for an improved broadband service and maintained contact with potential providers. There will be an update on progress next month. More immediately the Broadband Action Group is anxious to learn about the need for better broadband for existing or potential <u>business</u> users.

It is recognised that business need is a strong economic argument for better broadband and the advice that we have had is that assessing the extent of this will help our case. Whilst there is a database of all registered businesses who pay business rates, there are many people in the Upper Deverills who work from home for part of the week or run a small business such as consultancy from home and who do not need any consent or to register with Wiltshire Council. We therefore need anyone in the Upper Deverills who has either an existing or potential business need to provide a few details so that we can use this information in a general form to argue our case to be a priority for faster broadband. We should therefore be very grateful if anyone who has any business related need, now or potentially in the future, could answer the questions below. Respondents can be anonymous if they wish but we do not need any sensitive commercial information and anything that is provided will be kept confidential and only used in aggregate form. The questions are:

- Do you operate a business that requires broadband based in the Upper Deverills? – Yes/No
- Do you work from home on occasions and require broadband for a business based elsewhere? – Yes/No
- If you do not have a business use at the moment, if there was a better broadband service would you be able and wish to either operate a business from the Upper Deverills or work from home? – Yes/No
- How important do you think the provision of an improved broadband service is for your business use? Answer on a scale of 1 to 10 where 1 is irrelevant and 10 crucial.
- Looking ahead five years how important do you think the provision of an improved broadband service will be for your business use? – Again answer on a scale of 1 to 10.
- How would you describe the extent of any business use? Light/Medium/ Heavy

Kingston Deverill WW1 War Memorial: the men behind the names

There are seven names on the First World War Memorial in Kingston Deverill churchyard. What follows is an attempt to make them less anonymous.

Walter Dunford was born in 1895, the fourth son of Charles, farmer, and Amelia who lived at Manor Farm, Monkton Deverill. They also had four other sons and four daughters. He enlisted at Warminster, initially in 11th Reserve Cavalry Regiment. Later he transferred to 1st Battalion Hampshire Regiment. He died of wounds on 1st September 1915 and is buried in Amiens.

Percy Garrett was born in 1892, the eldest son of Abraham, gamekeeper, and Catherine. They lived at 51 Kingston Deverill. He had a twin sister, an elder sister and a younger brother. He enlisted at Bradford-on-Avon in 1/4th (TF) Battalion, Duke of Edinburgh's (Wiltshire) Regiment. He died on 20th September 1918 whilst serving in Egypt and is buried in Cairo.

William Grevatt. It is not clear why this name appears on the War Memorial. There is no mention of him in any of the relevant censuses and only one such name appears in the military records of the First World War. This namesake was born in Halifax in Yorkshire and was in 2/7 Battalion, Prince of Wales (West Yorkshire Regiment). He was killed on 10th April 1917.

Edwin Lewer was born in 1888, the second son of William, gamekeeper, and Sarah Ann. They lived at Forest Cottage, West Woodlands, moving later to East Woodlands. They had three other sons and two daughters. Edwin became a wheelwright then enlisted at Devizes and became a Lance Corporal in 1st Battalion, Duke of Edinburgh's (Wiltshire) Regiment. He was killed on 2nd September 1915 and his name appears on the Ypres (Menin Gate) Memorial.

Frank Mabbett was born in 1886, the second son of Alfred, railway engine driver, and Emily. In the 1901 census the family is registered as living in South-ampton, and comprises three other sons and two girls. It is almost certain that Frank's father previously lived at 36 Church Road, Brixton Deverill. Frank married in March 1905 and at the time of his death his wife Ada was living in Kettering. He served in the Northants Regiment, and later 4th Battalion, Suffolk Regiment. He died on 25th April 1917 and is listed on the Arras Memorial.

Herbert Poolman was born at 79 Monkton Deverill in 1885 and was the eldest son of Andrew, wheelwright, and Mary. They had two other sons and two daughters. At the time of his death his wife was living at 53 Codford St Mary. He enlisted in Devizes, and became a Sergeant in 2nd Battalion, Duke of Edinburgh's (Wiltshire) Regiment later transferring to the Durham Light Infantry. He died on 23rd January 1917 and is buried either at Le Quesnoy or at Valenciennes.

Albert Tudgay was born in 1877, the only son of Thomas, agricultural labourer, and Eliza. He had three sisters. At the time of his birth, the family was living at 69 Kingston Deverill, having previously lived at 21 and subsequently at 65. He was a driver in the RASC and was drowned when HT *Cameronian* was torpedoed and sunk off Alexandria on 2nd June 1917. His name is commemorated

Although I've lived here for many years, I had never been in the Prince Leopold at Upton Lovell. The new owners took over in Summer 2010 and closed for refurbishment. This was very successful. There is a wide choice on the menu, e.g. starters of moules (£6) or devilled kidneys (£5.50) and mains such as duck breast, wild boar stew, sole (£13.50 - £15.50), but turn the page and you will see what is called 'grazing'. From a list of 13 items, you could have three for £7.50 or five for £10. Some examples: baba ghanoush, mini game pie, tzatziki, Wiltshire ham. We imagined bite-sized portions but these versions of Wiltshire tapas were anything but. All five of each person's choice were served on a slate. The menu is available for lunch and dinner seven days a week.
