We live in a society that reveres the youthful, the successful, the beautiful, that hold up an air brushed image of perfection as a model of what it means to be human. God does not ask for perfection, only love. Often, we suffer agonies of self doubt because we compare ourselves to other people and find ourselves wanting; the journey to self acceptance can be a long and hard one. How liberating then to know that our creator God knows the secrets of our hearts *and loves us still*. How extraordinary to learn that that however hateful we are, and we can all be hateful at times I think you would agree, we are loved, we are loved, we are loved ---- and in the loving, we too, baggy eyes and all, are made lovely.

Longbridge Deverill Parish Council



At the full council meeting on 6th July there were lengthy discussions regarding the proposed Full Planning for land south of Farm Bungalow, Deverill Road, Sutton Veny, replacing four poultry buildings with new ones and with provision for the associated infrastructure. The council concluded the impact of increased heavy traffic, with up to 100 lorry, tractor and trailer trips to and from the proposed site along Sand Street to the A350 at Longbridge Deverill would be dangerous to other road users and residents. The road is unsuitable due to its narrow width, no pavements and poor state of repair. The Council objected to the application on the grounds: The proposed development should not be permitted because of the inadequate access road between the site and the A350 at Longbridge Deverill. The Upper Deverills Parish Council needs a new team member; if you would like to take the wishes of the Parish Plan forward and enhance the lives of the community you live in please apply.

What is a councillor? They are elected to represent a ward in Upper Deverills - the villages of Brixton, Monkton and Kingston Deverills. They are either elected every four years or co-opted. **What do councillors do?** There are three main components. **1. Decision making** - Through meetings and attending committees councillors decide which activities to support, where money is spent, what services to deliver and what policies to implement. **2. Monitoring** - Councillors ensure their decisions lead to efficient and effective services. **3. Getting involved locally** - As local representatives, councillors have responsibilities towards their constituents and local organisations. These depend on what the councillor wants to achieve and how much time is available and may include meetings of local organisations such as the Rural Police Neighbourhood Tasking Group, The Warminster Area Board and taking up issues on behalf of members of the public.

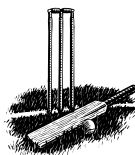
How much time does it take up? Often councillors say that their duties occupy them for about half an hour a week, although some councillors may spend more time than this but mainly being a parish councillor is an enjoyable way to contribute to your community and help to make it a better place to live and work.

Kingston Deverill School Logbook - part 16



1947 – Jun 16: ration books changed. The end of the war brought no immediate reduction in the rationing of food, clothing or petrol. Indeed the reverse happened, since the harvest of 1946 was so poor that bread rationing was introduced in that year, and in 1947 the severe winter had ruined the potato crop so that potato rationing was also added. It is doubtless these two events that resulted in the children's ration books being changed. It is also worth mentioning that bread remained rationed until 1948, clothing until 1949 and meat until 1953, making the feeding and clothing of children at school and at home a nightmare post-war problem. It should also be remembered that mains electricity did not reach the Upper Deverills until 1951. Of more significance to the children themselves was the fact that sweets were not removed from the ration books until 1953 – although many of them were probably inured to existing on one square of chocolate a week, making obesity a distant prospect. **Nov 20: School closed for Royal Wedding. Party for children from 3 villages held 2-5. Tea paid for by Mr Stratton.** The wedding of Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh must have seemed a welcome bright spot in these bleak years.

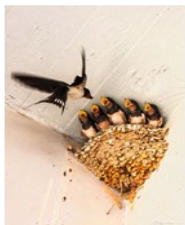
1948 – Jan 26: school to pantomime. Feb 4: this has become a Voluntary Controlled School from Dec 31, 1947. Under the Education Act of 1944, 'Voluntary Schools', that is to say schools – mostly Primary – who were governed and run by religious groups, were offered the option of 'aid' or 'control' by the state, the object being to improve the school facilities by means of finance derived from the taxpayer. KD School chose the Voluntary Control option which meant that the local Education Authority would in future appoint all members of staff and finance any necessary maintenance, although the Church of England would continue to own the building and retain a presence on the governing body. **Apr 14: county architect came to consult about the future of the field behind the school. Apr 26: School closed this afternoon for the Silver Wedding of the King and Queen.**

Kingston Deverill Village History - can you help?

As some Kingston Deverill residents will know, I have been engaged for some time in putting together a fairly comprehensive history of the village, the serialised story of the village school being one of the proposed five chapters. I have almost completed the task – in so far as that is possible – but would be grateful to receive any personal or reported reminiscences concerning village events and activities which have occurred during the past 70–80 years, since documentary evidence for this period is sadly lacking. Nature Notes

It was good to see the rain recently. We certainly needed it as the ground was drying out and things were beginning to suffer. If you are a bird with young to feed that relies on probing the ground for food, then dry conditions make life very difficult. For this reason I started feeding the local blackbirds mealworms and dried fruit, both soaked, and they were readily taken. In fact now the blackbirds come looking for it, and if they see movement in the kitchen they make themselves known. I am always amazed at how many bits of food a blackbird can accommodate in its beak, and how it can carry on picking up more when you think it is full up without dropping any that it has already collected!



The swallows in the stables have successfully reared their first brood; the youngsters flew last weekend and we are pretty sure there were four. The two house martin nests at the front of the house are very active with the parents bringing in food for the young. The nest nearest the office window appears to be more advanced and the chicks are now peering out. A few minutes ago I saw one turn itself around to release a faecal sac out of the nest; a clever way of keeping the nest clean, though the winter jasmine

below will get a coating, good fertilizer though. Earlier in the week I saw a very good number of swifts flying high over the village, together with the odd house martin, during the middle of the day. They were around again later in the evening, together with more house martins, but this time flying low. It was quite an overcast and stormy day, what I would class as atmospheric, and they were obviously feasting on clouds of insects attracted by the river and water meadows. From what I have seen, swifts and house martins quite often fly around together but swallows do not seem to associate with swifts as much. Swallows and house martins quite happily socialise, in fact in the autumn they gather together before migrating.

The tadpoles have developed into miniature amphibians; difficult to tell frog from toad at that size. They were swimming around the pond trying to find a way out, there were a few but given the size of the pond we thought they could do with some help. So Clive managed to rig up several carpet ladders for them which they readily took to. We have not had any ducks for several weeks, but the kingfisher came back on the 22nd June and then visited for several days, then came again last Monday. A heron came on Monday too, the first we have seen for ages. I think these fishing birds turn up in certain light conditions which make it easier to see the fish in the pond; it was dull and overcast on Monday.



We have had a couple of different birds coming to the feeders; the great spotted woodpecker is back and a male siskin came yesterday. The birds are eating more at the moment; food consumption had gone down but now there are lots of young birds coming to dinner as their diet moves from insectivorous to seed. I will have to order some more food!

Method

1. Pre-heat the oven to 180°C/Fan 160°C/Gas 4. Grease two sandwich tins then line the base of each tin with baking parchment. 2. Measure the butter, sugar, eggs, flour and baking powder into a large bowl and beat until thoroughly blended. Divide the mixture evenly between the tins and level out. 3. Bake in the pre-heated oven for about 25 minutes or until well risen and the tops of the cakes spring back when lightly pressed with a finger. Leave to cool in the tins for a few minutes then turn out, peel off the parchment and finish cooling on a wire rack. 4. When completely cold, sandwich the cakes together with the jam. Sprinkle with caster sugar to serve.

Fruit Scones (6) *Ingredients:*

| 75g (2 ½oz) butter, chilled - cut into cubes, plus extra for greasing | |
| 350g (12 oz) self-raising flour, plus extra for dusting | |
| 1 ½ tsp baking powder | |
| 75g (2 ½ oz) sultanas | 30g (1 oz) caster sugar |
| 2 large eggs, beaten | 150ml (5fl oz) milk |



Method

1. Preheat the oven to 220°C (Fan 200°C/425°F/Gas 7). Lightly grease a large baking sheet. 2. Make a light crumbly dough: put the flour and baking powder into a large chilled mixing bowl. Add the cubes of butter, keeping all the ingredients as cold as possible. Rub the butter in lightly and quickly with your fingertips until the mixture looks like fine breadcrumbs. Stir in the sugar and sultanas. 3. Pour 100ml of the milk and all but 2 tablespoons of the beaten egg into the flour mixture. Mix together with a round-bladed knife to a soft, but not too sticky dough, adding a bit more milk if needed to mop up any dry bits of mixture in the bottom of the bowl. 4. Turn the dough out onto a lightly floured work surface, lightly knead just a few times only until gathered together, then gently roll and pat out to form a rectangle about 2cm (3/4in) deep. 5. Cut out as many rounds as possible from the first rolling with a 6cm (2 1/2in) cutter (a plain cutter is easier to use than a fluted one) and lay them on the baking sheet, spaced slightly apart. Gather the trimmings, then roll and cut out again. Repeat until you have 10 scones. 6. Brush the tops of the scones with the reserved egg. Bake for about 10 minutes, or until risen and golden. Remove and cool on a wire rack.
