As I sit at my desk preparing to write this letter two images are rattling around my head; one is of the snowdrops that are appearing in their droves in the churchyards, little candles of hope in these dark cold days. And the other is a photograph of two good-looking young men, arms wrapped around each other's shoulders, faces lit up by beaming smiles as they pose proudly for the camera, radiating an exuberant youthful promise. I looked at the photograph for a long time and thought how innocent they looked, how similar to my sons. Except these young men are dressed in the uniform of war, their weapons and ammunition proudly displayed on their bodies for all to see, these young men would give their lives - and probably will - for a cause they passionately believe in. And you have to ask yourself the question: What happened? What vacuum in somebody's life provides the breeding ground for extreme radicalisation and what ills in our society provide the wider context for this? What is it that enables an ordinary young man to believe inflicting violence and terror on other human beings is the right thing to do?

Clearly, such behaviour is totally unacceptable, but it does not arise out of nowhere. In our shock and fearfulness it is easy for us to distance ourselves from those who perpetrate such attacks by convincing ourselves that somehow such people are 'other'. In doing so we can then absolve ourselves of any responsibility for the creation of a society where disaffected young men are easy targets for radicalisation and subsequent involvement in terrorism.

The threat of terrorism understandably makes us all edgy and fearful and being fearful can have a profound effect upon the way we engage with those whom we perceive to be 'different'. In trying to frame a response to all this I keep coming back to the story of the Good Samaritan. It is not the cosy story we love to tell; Jews and Samaritans were mortal enemies, it was an absolute no-no for them to mix in any way, shape or form and the notion of a 'good' Samaritan is an oxymoron that would have had Jesus' listeners shaking their heads in disbelief. In having the Samaritan stop and tend to the injured Jew, Jesus smashes through centuries of hatred and mistrust and shows us that 'There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus.' (Galatians 3: 28)

All of us are part of the human family; the story of The Good Samaritan is Jesus' answer to the question 'Who is my neighbour?'. At this time of uncertainty and fear we must do all we can to promote respect and tolerance with regard to those whose beliefs are different to ours. When we feel threatened it is horribly tempting to retreat into ghetto mentality and build walls of mistrust; far better to respond to our own fears by reaching out to others to enable dialogue that enhances mutual respect and understanding. And that brings me back to the snowdrops; just as you wait and wait and then out of the cold earth they miraculously appear, in our sad old world it is often hard to see signs of beauty and hope amidst the darkness. Let us pray that we can have the courage to be such signs by refusing to Kowtow to an agenda of fear and by loving our neighbour – whoever that might be – as ourselves.

Nature Notes

Today we have had snow for the first time this winter. I wonder whether we will have any more and how much? It has been wet snow and driven on a strong wind a lot of the time which has resulted in the bird feeders getting very wet and bunged up, much to the annoyance of the greenfinches. They seem to be the bullies of my feeding station and easily displace the more timid and smaller goldfinches. Great tits are dominant too and will push away the smaller tit species. We have had long-tailed tits coming more regularly to the fat and peanuts, and I counted at least 9 one time. I



have not seen any coal tits for quite a while now; back in 2013 we had a pair nest and bring the young to the feeders. On a positive note we have good numbers of both great and blue tits coming regularly to the feeders. Another regular diner is the great spotted woodpecker, both male and female birds come but so far I have yet to see them visit together. As I have mentioned before the male can be distinguished from the female by the red on the back of its neck. Both sexes have red under the tail. This morning, before the snow came on hard, we had 2 male bullfinches in the garden sitting on a bush in the early morning sunlight. Their colours were absolutely vivid almost unreal; jet black cap, red/pink breast and grey back. They are one of my favourite visitors to the garden.

About 10 days ago we cleaned the nest boxes out ready for use this year. Out of six boxes, four were used last year; three were hole-nesting and used by great/blue tits and the other was open-fronted and used by a robin. We have also a three holed terrace sparrow nest box but that has yet to be used after 2 years in place, we might think of moving it if it is not used this coming year. To clean the boxes we take them down, remove any nesting material and any livestock (such as spiders, pupae, woodlice) and then use boiling water to flush them out, checking that the drainage holes in the bottom are free from debris.

The fallen apples continue to attract the birds, mainly blackbirds and fieldfares, but sometimes accompanied by redwings and starlings. The mistle thrushes enjoy the apples too. They use the top of the nearby cherry tree as a singing post from where they project their melodious song which carries well. They also use the ash tree close by; both trees are tall and are ideal to call from. If we get harsher weather, more birds will undoubtedly come looking for food. The natural larder in the hedgerows and fields of berries, seed and nuts will be running out. So feeding in the garden becomes more important, and will help them to survive and keep in good condition in order to breed when the weather improves. I provide a variety of foods: peanuts, sunflower hearts, mixed seed, niger seed and fat (balls or block) which in turn attracts a variety of birds. Water is very important, not just to drink, but for bathing to keep the feathers in good condition; vital for insulation against the cold.

The Deverills and Crockerton Rainfall Figures for 2014



The report for the weather in this parish for 2014, is in sharp contrast to 2013. In 2014 the rainfall taken from 5 rain gauges spread across the watershed of River Wylye, within the Parish, when totted up reveal an average for the Parish of 45.99 inches fell in 2014. Now that is a wet year!

The highest record comes as usual from the west end of the Parish 48.38 inches measured at Kingston Deverill. The least amount was recorded at Longbridge Deverill, where I measured 42.87 inches.

December 2013, then January and February 2014, combined to produce 24.90 inches in Kingston and some 20.0 inches in Longbridge. As a result, it was very sad to see sand bags outside various houses to prevent flooding. However, it was rather marvellous to see the water meadows beyond Longbridge Church take that excess of water, store it and probably kept the floods away from our houses .

The driest month was September when 0.75 inches was recorded.

As I write this gales are forecast, and we have experienced very few frosts so far and only one quite hard frost of minus 4 Degrees C. The effect of such a mild autumn and first half of the winter has brought on all sorts of plants that should be waiting to make appearance later in the winter. Usually in January my feeders for the small birds are being refilled on a daily basis, this winter it has been very different, and replenishment has been a weekly chore instead.

Since the year 2000, here at Manor Farm, Longbridge Deverill, I have recorded the annual rainfall as follows; the average of the following 15 years is 37.046 inches. There is always a natural difference between west and east, i.e. Kingston and Longbridge.

I do wish more people would keep rainfall and weather records. It is so easy to do, and interesting. In particular, may I drop a hint to Crockerton School to invest in a weather station, which can be purchased quite cheaply on the internet and is automatic. It looks after itself even at weekends!



Kingston Deverill School part 10 - School Logbook

1934 – Jun 10: Diocesan Report – 'on the whole the children are not of the brightest'. From 1932 until the closure of the school in 1969 we have an 'Admissions Register' which details the birth, parentage and address of each child. As a result, it would be possible to name and shame every student who is so disparagingly described as above – but it would be invidious to do so. Jul 24: outing to Weymouth.



1935 - Apr 17: Mrs Phoebe Garland gives up post as Head Teacher. Apr 29: Mrs Doris Ivy Richards commences duties as Head Teacher. The current owner of the School House received a letter from Mrs Richards in February 1981 from her address in Welshpool, expressing a wish to visit the school and her old home. Sadly, however, she fell ill before she could come. She was 25 when she was appointed as Head mistress, and 71 when she wrote. May 7: Children late because of Jubilee Festivities the previous day, I have spoken to the parents and children about punctuality and attendance. Obviously a strict adherence to the school timetable was of more significance than the celebrations which marked the 25th anniversary of King George V's accession. May 11: the supply of coal and wood is very inadequate and we have very little left to make fires on wet days. Jul 11:Inspection - 'very good work is being done in the school under the new head teacher'. It is evident that the school had been through a very difficult time during the long periods of absence through illness of the previous Headmistress, Phoebe Garland. The constant changes amongst the teaching staff had a serious effect on the children's education. Jul 26: a concert was given by the children. Everyone from KD, BD and MD was invited. Programmes were sold at 1d each (made by the children) and a collection taken raised £1.15s and a halfpenny

1936 –junior class visited 'Black Earth' excavation. We found some pots and stones of interest. We are starting a museum. A number of archaeological excavations took



place on Cold Kitchen Hill immediately to the north of the school, throughout the 1930s. One of these sites was entitled 'Black Earth Field' but research at the Devizes Museum Library has not revealed who was responsible for this particular dig. The excavations yielded artefacts from Roman times and earlier, the more important finds are now displayed in the Museum. This perhaps puts in context the imaginative concept of the children setting up a museum of their own. They were fortunate indeed to be allowed on the site and to remove some of the doubtless less important 'treasures'.

Planning Application for 8 New Houses in Kingston Deverill

Some people in the community may have been misled by the information in the January edition of the Parish news which implied the proposed planning application would "...satisfy the Upper Deverills Parish Plan". The Upper Deverills Parish Plan does not set policy or quotas for housing development or for affordable and social housing. The Plan provides community views about specific questions relating to development in the Upper Deverills in general. In the case of Kingston Deverill, from 74 households there were 39 survey responses and 74% of these indicated a preference for no houses (9 households) or up to 5 houses (20). Only 9 households registered a view that they would be content to see more than 5 new dwellings. Furthermore, 54% of responses indicated a wish not to see development in fields or open spaces By some margin the views expressed in the Parish Plan do not underpin the proposal for 8 dwellings and directly contradict the claim that the proposal will "satisfy" the Plan. The Community should be aware that their Parish Plan may be used to influence decisions. in this case about development, but such decisions should be based on the evidence that supports the Plan, adjusted by any better and more recent official information. Applications that use the Parish Plan to substantiate proposals that are contradicted by evidence from community views should be challenged.

Recipe of the month - Mango Mousse

Sponsored by Maiden Bradley Community Shop Ingredients

14 oz can mangoes Juice of half a lemon 3 teaspoons powdered gelatine 10 fl oz whipping cream Fresh mango slices and lemon strips to decorate **Method**

Drain the can of mangoes and puree the fruit with the lemon juice in a blender or through a sieve. Pour into a bowl, sweeten with castor sugar to taste. Sprinkle the gelatine over 5 tablespoons of water in a small bowl, leave to soften for 2 - 3 minutes. Stand the bowl in a saucepan of hot water and stir until the gelatine has dissolved. Stir into the fruit puree and then put in a cool place until it is on the point of setting. Whip cream lightly and fold into the mango mixture. Divide into 4 dessert dishes and decorate with the fresh mango slices and strips of lemon peel.

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
