'June is busting out all over' says the song from Carousel, and let us hope this year we can enjoy a long hot summer. Certainly we were blessed in early May with generally good weather, not least during the



Deverill Festival weekend. I am absolutely certain that the Festival fulfilled all the expectations of the organisers. Considered by some outsiders to be very ambitious before the event, all doubts were cast aside by those who attended concerts, recitals, plays and comedies, never mind the very informative walks hosted by local historians. The organisers deserve our very grateful thanks for all their hard work in providing us with a wide range of events for our entertainment and education. The whole programme encouraged an expansion of our community spirit in whichever of the designated venues.

Whilst listening to the concerts and recitals, I was reminded yet again what splendid buildings our churches are, both historically and architecturally. Furthermore, they fulfil most of the necessary ticks in boxes as concert halls because of their excellent acoustic qualities. More than one musician commented in this regard. As cherished buildings in our community they require essential maintenance. To help us achieve this requirement Quinquennial Reviews by expert architects are demanded by the diocese. Fortunately the respective church reports identify which urgent actions are necessary soonest with other requirements identified to be considered during the quinquennium. One known requirement is to confirm that electrical wiring in the churches is up to scratch.

The **Benefice Service on Sunday 29th June** will be different in that pets are invited. This promises to be an exciting challenge. The church wardens would be grateful for prior warning of possible exotic animal attendance plus notice of specific requirements for such pets or their owners. In view of the proximity to Longleat it is worth noting that we are not expecting 'pets' from there.

Nature Notes

The colours are absolutely gorgeous this time of the year. There are so many different shades of green setting off the vivid yellow of the oilseed rape. Yellow is also provided by laburnum and the wonderful scented azalea. There is the mauve of the foxglove, lilac and rhododendron and the beautiful blue haze of bluebells. Finally, there is the white frothiness along the roadside verges provided by cow parsley, another name for it is Queen Anne's lace. This white frothiness is repeated in the hedgerows by the hawthorn.

We have 3 nest boxes I know are in use. The one at the front, visible from the kitchen, is being used by a pair of great tits. They have been zooming back and forth with food non stop and going straight into the box. This morning I noticed that they stopped short and started wing quivering, an action associated with the young begging for food, perhaps they are trying to coax them out of the box. The young fledge from 16 - 22 days, so I think they will be out soon, they are certainly noisy now and attracting Stitch's (local cat) interest. The other 2 boxes are both being used by blue tits. I know the eggs have hatched as I can hear the young but neither box is easy to watch without worrying the adults. The pair of blackbirds, mentioned last month, have 2 youngsters and watching the male bird feed them I reckon the female is already sitting on a second clutch of eggs. I have been putting mealworms out on the saddle stones in front of the kitchen window providing a good view. Recently one of the youngsters had a Eureka moment realizing it no longer needed 'Dad' to feed it, it was perfectly capable of picking up its own mealworm. The other youngster was bemused and thought about asking its sibling for food before flying off after 'Dad' begging again. We have been lucky to have a family of mistle thrushes with 2 youngsters, feeding is shared between the parents, each parent taking one youngster into its care.

We have big black shoals of tadpoles in our pond, so far none with legs but getting bigger. I have also spotted a newt. The mallards continue to provide us with entertainment. Others have joined the original pair, our greatest number at one time is 6; 2 ducks and 4 drakes. When there are more males than females chaos ensues and they all fly off. Recently a pair flew in and after a short time the duck left the water wandering around the garden looking for a nesting site and then dropped back into the water. She started washing and preening giving the impression of mission accomplished, so there maybe eggs somewhere!

'Our' swallows are back in the stables, possibly two pairs. So far our house martin boxes are empty. Hopefully next month I will be able to tell you they are back. The swift box at the back of the house has attracted house sparrows; this morning there was a particularly vocal male hanging out of the hole. I don't know if a swift would evict a house sparrow, they must often find their old nest site occupied when they arrive to breed by other birds or even wasps and bees. There are good numbers of swifts now in town so look upwards when you are there next and listen for that high pitched squealing call.

At the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council, Richard Baxter was re-elected as Chairman and Graham Read as Vice Chairman. Unfortunately, the application is not on-line but can be seen at Blandford. In order to help Longbridge PC and Sutton Veny PC, the EA will send both clerks a CD of the plans, these will be passed to all councillors, it is anticipated this matter will be discussed at the next Parish Council meeting which is at 7.30 pm on **Monday 2nd June** in Longbridge Hall.

Roasted Root and Rocket Salad

Recipe sponsored by Maiden Bradley Community Shop

It is nearly summer - time to start thinking about salads! The BBQ will be coming out and a salad is always a healthy addition.

Ingredients - Serves 1

1 small parsnip 1 carrot Half a sweet potato Olive oil

2 tsp runny honey 1 heaped tsp wholegrain mustard 1 large handful fresh rocket sm handful nuts walnuts/pecans

25gms blue cheese eg. Stilton

Method - Preheat the oven to 200C/Gas 6

Cut the parsnip, carrot and sweet potato into thin batons. Place them on a roasting tray, drizzle with olive oil, season with salt and pepper and roast for about 30 minutes, or until they are soft and beginning to brown at the edges. Make a dressing by blending the honey, mustard and 1 tbsp olive oil. Season with salt and pepper. Remove the vegetables and allow to cool. Mix with the rocket and toss with the dressing. Scatter over the nuts and crumble over the blue cheese.

An Old Agriculturist's Ramblings - Ian Woodcock - Part 10

Having coped with two harvests with the help of a neighbour and contractor, I felt I must have my own combine and not rely on someone else so I purchased a second hand MF726 with an 8'6" cut and a tank for the grain instead of bags (no more sacks to be collected from the fields, bliss!) I also purchased a second hand Alvan-Blanch drier and a Eureka grain cleaner which I installed in an existing building but still filling hired sacks. The Ryehill harvest still had to be carried out with the contractor using a bagging combine and if it needed drying this was done by a neighbour's sack drier, very labour intensive.

As the cereal acreage was increased on both farms, in 1960 I purchased a MF415 combine with a 12' cut to cope with both harvests; at Ryehill a bin drier was installed in an old tythe barn which was last used as a cowshed, we gutted the cow stalls, concreted the gutters, dug another pit and installed a 12" grain auger to load the lorries outside. With this larger combine to be manoeuvred around the farm entailed enlarging all the gateways.

With the passage of time improved varieties of cereals were being produced, better use of fertilisers, greater use of herbicides, growth regulators, pesticides increased grain outputs, so in 1968 a higher output combine was required and a MF515 with a 14' cutter bar was bought, (1 year old second hand of course) part of the deal being that I would arrange collection of this machine from a farm near Shrewton. We set off, I driving the Land Rover in front with headlights on, a 'Wide Load' sign hanging on the radiator, my farm student perched on the table on the off side to help guide oncoming traffic to pass, (no health and safety those days!) through Chitterne, Heytesbury before the by-pass was built, Sutton Veny and back to Ryehill without further ado, safely and a sigh of relief.

History of Kingston Deverill School part 3

For information about the school between 1859 and 1898 we are solely dependent upon the Census Returns and Kelly's Directory. These sources tell us in 1861 the teacher was Leah Pressley, aged



20. By 1871 she had been succeeded by Georgina Callaghan, aged 29, she in turn was followed by Anne Gilbert (18) Headteacher and Elizabeth Ford (26) assistant, who appear in the 1881 census. In a Directory entry for 1889 we read: 'In KD there is a National School (mixed) built in 1853 for 60 children; average attendance 30; Mrs C Wheeler, Mistress.' Meanwhile, the Government had passed the Elementary Education Act of 1870 which aimed to make education compulsory for all children between the ages of 5 and 13. In order to achieve this it set up School Boards in areas which had been identified by census returns as indicating that a number of children were not attending school, and instructed these Boards to obtain funds in order to provide school places where there was a shortfall. Most parents were still required to pay a small fee for their children's education, receipt of government funding was to an extent dependent upon the children's attendance. The Act also made provision for the institution of 6 'Standards' by which the children could be judged on their abilities in Reading, Writing and Arithmetic, school classes were set up on this basis, with 'Standard 1' being at the lowest, or Infant level. The Act took a long time to implement, it was not until 1880 that the ideal of compulsory attendance was accomplished. We now reach a period when we are able to give a more detailed and intimate view of the school and its daily life by the existence of the Headteacher's Logbook dating from 1898 and continuing to the closure of the school in 1969. The following entries were chosen at random attempting to give an idea of the aims and activities of the children and their teachers over a period of 70 years encompassing 2 World Wars and substantial social change. 1898 – Dec 12: 40 children present. Rev Moore visited school this morning. Since the school was a C of E foundation, the local Rector was the school manager and paid regular visits. William Moore was appointed to the KD benefice in 1885. 1899 – Mar 23: Standard 111 were very careless in Arithmetic, and Standard 11 in Geography. Sep 28: several boys away potato picking. Nov 1: am disappointed in all the infants' work. Nov 6: Rev. Moore is leaving the parish. The vacancy will be filled by Rev. Edmund Caudwell. Edmund Caudwell remained as Rector until 1903. 1900 - Jan 23: school closed today for the children's Xmas Tree given by Mr. Stratton. Feb 14: school closed today on account of very deep fall of snow. Mar 28: Rose Draper (Infants' teacher aged 17) 7 minutes late this morning. Apr 9: Inspection by George Gordon – 'the Upper Deverills infants' Arithmetic was very poor indeed. Only one child got anything at all right. In the lower division, 2 children who have been in the school over 12 months do not yet know their letters.' Jul 2: Govt. report -'It's a nice little county school. The teaching is bright and effective.' Obviously the standard of teaching and learning had shot up in the three months between the two inspections.




