The Rector writes:

In April, our parish held its Annual Parochial Church Meeting. It is like an annual meeting of any organisation. It gives an opportunity to review the past year, consider the organisation's 🖉 finances, look forward to the events of the current year and importantly thank 'supporters' for their continuing commitment.



The present financial climate is challenging for us all. Most people find themselves 'watching the pennies' a little more than in the past as they try to find ways to economise. This is true domestically. It is true for our churches. It is quite right that the members of any organisation support it financially. However, not many organisations with relatively small membership have the responsibility of maintaining listed buildings of which our parish has four.

There are frequent misconceptions about church finance. Many people assume that churches are supported from central funds. This is NOT the case. Congregations all over the country are expected to contribute to their respective dioceses (in our case, - Salisbury) in order that clergy stipends, housing and pensions can be paid. This payment is known as 'the Share' and calculated annually, and is based on the number of worshippers/members. That cost is in addition to the general running costs incurred keeping our churches open and in use. There is a significant and increasing shortfall between income and expenditure, particularly noticeable for upkeep of fabric.

It is sometimes frustrating when financial matters take so much time and energy. However, given the size of the challenge which congregations are faced, it is not so surprising.

In the meantime, enjoy the rich heritage that our churches are, and rejoice that they continue to be valued and available! With every blessing,

Nature Notes

We have been in our new house for almost 11 months. I didn't start feeding the birds until we had that very cold spell with snow back in January. Up until then I had just been watching and taking note of what was about. Sadly, so far I have not seen a tree sparrow but I have a superb view of bullfinches feeding on the fruit buds just outside my bedroom window. There were regular visits from the green woodpecker when the ants were active last year. Then on the Sunday morning after the snow in January about 200 fieldfares landed to feed on the fallen apples.

We have a large pond in the garden and that attracts a lot of wildlife. At the beginning of March we had an orgy of frogs, I have never seen them spawning in the wild only on the TV. I had not heard a frog croak, in the flesh as it were, so it was great to hear them. The result of all the activity was a large mass of frog spawn but I am not sure whether it will have survived the very cold weather that we have



been experiencing, time will tell. Last summer we had dragonflies and damselflies flying about which interested one of the local cats, Stitch, I was worried that he would lose his footing as he reached out to try and catch one, he never did of course! Also last year a kingfisher visited almost every day, a male as it had a black bill (the female has an orange lower bill - wears lipstick!): I saw him catch goldfish several times. Yesterday another bird came fishing, a heron, after a long and patient hunt it caught something amongst the rushes. Judging by the shape and colour I think it was an amphibian, a frog or toad, there are both in the garden and I have to remember to be careful when gardening. We occasionally saw a toad at the farm but I don't remember seeing a frog. I saw a newt last year when tidying the heathers but I am not sure which type, probably common. For the last week or so we have had a pair of mallard coming to the pond, they are tolerating us quite well now, at first they were easily spooked. A little egret visited the garden on Easter Saturday, but I must have moved too fast inside the house and frightened it away.

Spring is so late this year and up to this morning we still had bramblings feeding in the garden. The warmer weather that they are now predicting should trigger their departure and hopefully the arrival of swallows. Last year we had a swallow nest in the stables and they had at least one successful brood. The house martins should arrive a few weeks after the swallows. Last year we had a double house martin nest put up on the front of the house (opposite an existing nest on the property across the road from us). It was used and one successful brood was raised. At the beginning of May the swifts should come. We are lucky in Longbridge Deverill to have swifts around, I saw a good number feeding over the river last summer. I don't know whether there are any nests in the village? Swifts are in decline and need our help. Last Monday evening I attended a really good talk on swifts. They are amazing birds. Supreme flyers, they feed, mate and sleep on the wing and only land to nest. What would summer be without their aerobatic displays and screaming calls? The Chapel of St Lawrence, High Street, Warminster

Recipe of the Month - Mackerel Baked with Yoghurt and Cream Sponsored by Maiden Bradley Community Shop

4 medium-sized mackerel cleaned 4 tablespoons fresh double cream Lemon wedges

1 (5 fl oz) carton natural yoghurt Salt and pepper Watercress



Wash the mackerel; dry well and place in an oven-proof dish. Beat the yoghurt and cream together. Season to taste and pour over the fish. Bake at Gas mark 5, 375°F or 190°C for 15-20 minutes until the fish is cooked through. Garnished with watercress and lemon wedges. Fish is good for you, especially oily fish for the heart. If it makes you feel better use low fat yoghurt instead of cream!



Elections take place on **Thursday 2nd May.** These are for County




