Dear All

May, glorious May, unquestionably one of the most beautiful months of the year. The month was named after Maia, the Roman Goddess of Spring and Growth. Traditional British May Day rites and celebrations include Morris Dancing, Crowning of the May Queen and festivities involving a maypole. Much of the tradition



derives from the pagan Anglo-Saxon customs along with many Celtic traditions. May Day itself has been a traditional day of festivities throughout the centuries and is mostly associated with towns and villages celebrating springtime fertility (of the soil, livestock and people) and revelry with village fetes and community gatherings. Since the reform of the Catholic calendar, 1st May is the feast of Joseph the Worker, the patron saint of workers and craftsmen. In rural communities seeding had been completed by this date so it was convenient to give farm labourers a day off. These days in many countries 1st May is celebrated as International Labour Day. May Day was abolished and its celebration banned by puritan parliaments during the **Interregnum** (1649- 1660) but reinstated with the restoration of Charles II in 1660.

We have no plans to abolish celebrations during our **Interregnum**, in fact we hope to expand them and develop our Stewardship of Time and Talents within the community. Part of the diversity of the creation is the unique way in which we each have been created and equipped with talents, aptitudes, gifts and skills. This is true of musical, teaching, financial and academic talents, but it is also true of the spiritual gifts we have received. Being part of the Church does not just mean going to church on Sunday, although that is a good start. The parish thrives because its members get involved and support the life and worship of the church. Many people, including those who are not regular churchgoers make a huge contribution by giving time, practical and creative ability to the local community, may this continue and expand.

Meanwhile the appointment process for our new Priest–in–Charge continues and the new timetable agreed with the Archdeacon is as follows:

Advertise in the Church Times on 6th and 14th June;

Closing date for applicants 7th July; Short listing 10th July;

Familiarisation day Monday 21st July; Formal interviews Tuesday 22nd July.

Please continue to pray that our advert and profile generates a good response and that the right person comes forward. In the meantime we continue to be ably served by the Rev Di Britten and a number of visiting priests and heartily thank them for their support, especially retired Reverends Tony Watts and Harold Stephens.

Finally, we should all remember those less fortunate than ourselves. Christian Aid Week from 11th - 17th May gives us the chance to do that. Christian Aid's philosophy is to educate and enable people to support their own families by their own efforts. Christian Aid envelopes are available in the churches of the Benefice if you wish to make a donation. Last year 20,000 churches across the country raised over £12m during Christian Aid Week. See page 7 for more information and to read how your donation can also help people suffering the devastating ravages of war.

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Nature Notes

The sun is out and the sky is blue but it seems very empty and quiet to me. I keep looking up expectantly hoping to see swallows. I saw one last Friday, 11th April, flying very high but it was not one of 'ours'. Looking back to last year 'our' first swallow came on the 11th April so they are due any day, the anticipation is almost tangible.

Everywhere you look there are signs of spring having sprung. The trees are breaking into leaf, the blossom is coming out and the grass is growing. The countryside has coloured up and looks absolutely gorgeous. In the pond we have tadpoles, and a pair of mallard have made it their home. At first we were seeing 'Mr' and 'Mrs' on a regular basis and he would chase off any male intruders. Now we see 'Mr' quite often during the day but 'Mrs' comes just once late afternoon or early evening for a feed and wash and brush up, all done with great speed and purpose, and then she's gone again. We are sure that she is on eggs nearby. 'Mr' now tolerates the occasional male intruder which indicates to me that 'Mrs' is no longer ovulating/egg laying and therefore she is no prize so there is no competition between males. Hopefully there are ducklings to look forward to, but unlike last year when we had some at the end of July when the water lilies were in full growth, there is not much cover for them to hide in at the moment - just some reeds down one end.

So far this year seems to be good for butterflies. I have been seeing good numbers of small tortoiseshells and brimstones, some peacocks, the odd comma and now orange tip and speckled wood. There are lots of bumblebees about too and I am seeing swarms of flies and gnats which are very important in the ecosystem; they are eaten by both of birds and bats.



The dawn chorus is really stepping up a gear now; it is a proper bird symphony. The reason they sing so strongly in the morning is to let other birds know that they have survived the night and that this is their territory. It is the male birds that sing, the females will be on the nest. I find that it is the blackbird that starts the orchestra followed by the robin and then others join in. We have got some blackcaps singing and chiffchaffs too, but so far I have not heard a willow warbler; it has a lovely cascading call. We have yellowhammers along the far field hedge with their 'little bit of bread and no cheese' call. I find that early in the season they shorten the call so it becomes 'a little' or 'a little bit' and eventually they progress to the whole phrase.

We have a pair of blackbirds busy at the front of the house collecting food, at first very small worms, grubs and insects that you could hardly see in the beak. As the youngsters are growing so the food collected has got bigger and the worms now dangle out of the bill. I expect you have all got a local pair of blackbirds or robins that you are watching. Have fun observing them as they busily provide for their young.

Upper Deverills Parish Council

The Annual Parish meeting will be on Wednesday 14th May at 6.00 pm. This is a meeting of the electorate and members of Clubs and Societies who are invited to report on the past year and aspirations for the future. Grant cheques will be presented. Annual Parish Council Meeting will follow. All will be welcome.

Deverill Raptor and Owl Group

Last year went on record as the worst ever for barn owls. 2012 had not been good and the extremely cold weather in January and February 2013 continued into March with many owls dying. The females who survived struggled to reach a body weight heavy enough to breed. Of the dozen or so boxes monitored in the Deverill Valley only one had a pair of owls which laid eggs and reared young, which was very late in the year, with a very small brood. It was while ringing the 2 young owlets on 24th October that Major Nigel Lewis MBE, Wiltshire Barn Owl Conservation Network Adviser, said "It's not only barn owls that need help you know," and so the Deverill Raptor & Owl Group was born.

It is a practical working group whose aim is to provide nest boxes for raptors and owls of conservation concern in the Deverill Valley. Nigel is our expert adviser and a 'hands on' field worker together with Sally, Michael, Dick and Alison. We have two carpenters, Alan and Sally, and June who analyses the pellets regurgitated by the birds which gives a good idea of their prey.

There are already a reasonable number of barn owl boxes in the Valley and by the end of December we had added seventeen new boxes: ten kestrel, four little owl, one tawny and a further two for barn owls. Barn owls & kestrels are birds of conservation concern; little owls are in need of help, with tawny owls currently the least vulnerable of the species mentioned.

Our time & travel is given freely but we decided in view of the number of boxes to make an application to a charity for the cost of building materials; we are awaiting a response. Many individuals have offered to sponsor a box and we are grateful as this is testament of support for our project; should the charity refuse funding we shall be accepting the generous offers of sponsorship.

Will the new boxes be taken up by local owls and raptors? Tawnies are the first owls to breed, checking for this species began on 27th March; one tawny was sitting on 3 eggs and to our surprise a pair of barn owls on 6 eggs. Nigel commented that this is a month earlier than usual for this species. All barn owl boxes will be checked in a few weeks but this early breeding pair is brilliant news, showing that the barn owls which survived the rigours of 2 hard years are finding sufficient food and the females are reaching the breeding weight necessary to lay eggs.



An Old Agriculturist's Ramblings by Ian Woodcock - Part 9

Another memory that comes to mind is the notorious winter of 1963-4. When on Boxing Day we had a horrendous fall of snow overnight, roads blocked, the lorry that called daily to collect the churns of milk was unable to get up the steep hill to the farm. In those days no salt was used on the roads at all. A trailer was taken down to the Bath Arms at Crockerton, parked on the side of the road and with the use of my Land Rover, I took the churns down to this trailer each morning and collected the empty churns in the afternoon for the next milking. This continued for the next 5 weeks. We were only filling between 8-10 x 10 gallon churns daily. Each night there was a sharp frost which eventually meant that



Shearwater froze to a depth of 11 inches, crowds of people came from Warminster to enjoy skating. One brave farmer friend came and drove his Land Rover across! The snow was so deep down the back lane, I dug the children an igloo for them to play in!

The snow finally disappeared at the end of March when normality returned, arable work was badly delayed so a rush had to be made to prepare the fields for sowing the crops. One bonus of this was on one day I had a walk down across the farm on a nice sunny day, stepping over a fence into a field something shone and I stooped to pick it up to find a George III half sovereign, 1777, in mint condition which I kept until this Spring, put it in a coin sale in Salisbury, it made £400. A stroke of luck!

Cucumber, Yoghurt & Mint Soup

3 large cucumbers
50ml Greek yoghurt

History of Kingston Deverill School part 2

At the time of the establishment of the school in the carpenter's cottage on the site of the present School House in 1840 or just before, the Rector of KD was Lord Charles Thynne, who took over the benefice from his elder brother in 1837. Both brothers went on to higher things – John became Subdean of Lincoln Cathedral and Charles took up the same position at Canterbury Cathedral in 1845, but the patronage of the school by Longleat continued, as is proved by an entry in Kelly's Directory of 1848

Wesleyan Chapel. Miss Elizabeth Earl, Mistress of National School.'



The next mention of the school is from the 1851 Census which lists the occupants of no.13, the Rector's House, as including 'Emma Cozner, 22, Mistress at Parochial School' and 'Sophie Sturgess, 20, assistant teacher'. These young ladies were teaching in a tiny cottage, possibly with an ex-carpenter's workshop attached, and were living in the home of the new Rector Rev.D.M Clarke, who was effectively their manager. Sometime during the year, the Marquess of Bath realised that the school premises were completely inadequate for the purpose and drew up plans for a new building. The new school was completed in 1853 and is essentially the building as we see it today. It is likely that the whole structure was financed by the Marguess, although – as a National School – the establishment was also eligible for a small government grant under an Act of 1833.

which reads 'Here is a National School supported by the Marquis of Bath and a

The first mention of the school as we know it (later minor alterations apart) appears in 'Rev.Warburton's Census of Wiltshire Schools, 1859'. His report concerning schools in the locality is fascinating and is worth quoting in full 'KD pop. 402. 50-60 scholars, mixed, are taught by a mistress, untrained, in an excellent school-room with brick floor and wall desks. At MD 30-40 scholars, mixed, are taught by a mistress in a lean-to with brick floor and wall desks. Mistress well-informed but inexperienced. At LD 60-70 children taught by a certified master and pupil teacher in a school-room 48x17 and classroom 14x10 with boarded floor and parallel desks. Mr Hughes (Feb 1858) reports that discipline is very good and the instruction sound and judicious, though elementary. The LD school is the only one of this group under a master, and is consequently attended by several of the elder children from the Deverills and Crockerton. Crockerton has 40-50 children, mixed, who are taught by an unqualified mistress in a good schoolroom recently erected, with boarded floor and parallel desks. Mr Hughes (Mar 1857) reports unfavourably of discipline and doubtfully of the instruction.'

It might appear that Rev. Warburton is a shade sexist in his criticism of the women teachers, but it has to be remembered that certified teacher training was not available to them at this date, and it is for this reason that the master at LD school attracts a following amongst the parents of older children.
