



Nature Notes

'Our' house martins flew successfully and by the 13th September the nest was empty and I noticed that both house martins and swallows were gathering and feeding in large flocks building up reserves in preparation for their migration south. The last sighting I had of either was of two house martins flying low feeding over the winter stubble nearby and that was a week ago. But as they depart other birds come; fieldfares and redwings will soon be with us.

During September we had several visits from a hummingbird hawkmoth. It was attracted to the catmint flowers just below the kitchen window at the front of the house. At the back of the house I spotted a large caterpillar on a fuchsia and checking in the books it was an elephant hawkmoth caterpillar. We then spotted a second of these caterpillars on another fuchsia plant. I was a bit concerned for the fuchsias but they did not demolish the plants and by the end of September both caterpillars had moved from the plants and had presumably buried themselves in the soil to pupate. Until recently we have still been having dragonflies over the pond, big ones with green stripes which I am fairly sure are emperor dragonflies. But this wet and windy weather of late has proved too much for them. A few days ago I had to rescue one from the water and once out I could see it had quite a bit of damage to its wings probably down to the bad weather.

I have had to stop feeding the birds as I was seeing sickly greenfinches. I have always found them an indicator of any infection at the feeding station, and despite being as vigorous as possible with the cleaning and reducing the food, by the end of September I still had a problem. A sickly bird will be slow to fly away, often fluffed up and with Trichomoniasis, which is what I think was the problem, the bird will be breathing heavily. This is because Trichomoniasis is caused by a protozoan parasite which affects the throat making it difficult for the



bird to swallow and breathe. Looking it up on the internet I have found that the RSPB recommend stopping food and water for a minimum of 3 weeks to try and prevent the spread of disease. At least there is plenty of food in the hedgerows and fields for them at this time of the year.

Even though I am not providing food we have still had birds in the garden; the kingfisher most days, a heron the other day which was the first for a while, a grey wagtail and guite often a pair of long-tailed tits and mistle thrushes to name a few. The long-tailed tits are in close family groups at this time of the year and are continually on the move feeding and calling to one another as they go. The mistle thrushes have started making their football rattle like calls and this morning I heard one singing. Also this morning we had a small flock of about ten goldfinches feeding on the tarmac at the front of the house. I wondered for a moment what could be attracting them. I think it was probably the beech masts crushed by the coming and going of vehicles.

September was very dry and now October is, so far, trying to make up for that lack of rain. I wonder what sort of winter we are in for.

Nigel Hawkins reports on Moths in Brixton Deverill

"Look," said my friend John Langmaid, pointing to a silhouette against the sky by the edge of the thatch, "there's a Hummingbird Hawk-moth."



By no means common, this migrant from southern Europe and north Africa appears in the south of England in summer and occasionally overwinters here. It descended and hovered by a bunch of white phlox, its blurred wings moving faster than the eye could see. This specimen was about a inch and a half long and was soon joined by two others. The species, not the largest of the Hawk-moths, got its name being first mistaken for the smallest of the hummingbirds. Indeed it hovers like a hummingbird and sips nectar through an amazing proboscis, which is coiled up like a hose pipe when not in use. When extended, its proboscis is nearly as long as its body and, like the beaks of the hummingbirds, can reach into the depths of the trumpets of flowers.

To the uninitiated like me, one of the surprising things about moths is that whereas there are only about sixty species of butterfly in Britain, there are some 1,500 species of the smaller moths, the microlepidoptera, and half that number of the larger macro moths. The number of known species is gradually increasing, you could even find a new species in your back yard if you are exceptionally lucky and know how to recognise it. John discovered one six years ago in his garden in Portsmouth. The moth was minute and various world experts were consulted before it could be accepted as an undescribed species. Even then a species new to science should not be described and named on the basis of a single specimen; it was not until this year that more specimens were found elsewhere in England. Last month the species was formally described and, as John was its first discoverer, named Tetramoera langmaidi.

Alison Rymell reports on the Deverill Raptor and Owl Group

Earlier in the year I wrote about the formation of the Deverill Raptor and Owl Group [DROG] in response to two disastrous years for barn owls and other owls and raptors of conservation concern. The group aimed to provide nest boxes for kestrels and little owls with a few new barn owl boxes to supplement those already in the Valley. By last Christmas we had made and erected seventeen new boxes: ten kestrel; four little owl; two barn and one tawny owl.



The boxes were liked but not always by the species intended. Tawny owls have raised young in a kestrel box, a barn owl box and the new tawny box - sadly this box was predated. A little owl box was used by a great tit and a robin made a comfy home in a kestrel box. One new barn owl box was used by a pair of barn owls who raised 5 young. Stock doves used kestrel and barn owl boxes. A wood pigeon nested on top of a box and a jackdaw on the apron of a box! Despite their boxes being usurped in several instances, I am delighted to report 2014 is proving a good year for barn owls; the weather has been kinder and food sources abundant. So far we have ringed 29 young barn owls and 6 tawnies. A late second brood produced 7 young barn owlets ringed in mid-September. Next year we hope to have equal success with kestrels and little owls.

On 2nd September DROG was delighted to receive a Wessex Watermark Award and cheque covering the cost of materials for our new boxes. Thank you, Wessex Water and Deverill Valley community who have offered encouragement and funding.



Time to Wrap up Warm!

That time of year is creeping upon us once again and I for one am not sure if I am ready to be swaddled in layers of clothes as I go about my daily business. But, as the evenings are drawing

in, I thought it would be timely to write a few lines about keeping warm, and to say that there may be grants and payments available if you are struggling to keep your home heated. Fuel poverty (where a household spends more than 10% of its annual income on heating the home) affects approximately four million households in the UK. Older people are particularly vulnerable in cold weather. Professor Ian Philip, National Director for Older People, says that older people should think:

Head 50% of the body's heat is lost through the head.

Changes in body temperature, going from hot to cold, cold to hot can make the blood stickier which can lead to heart problems. Wrap up warm, inside and out. Several thin layers of clothes are better than one thick layer. Don't forget to wear hats, gloves and scarves. If possible, stay inside during cold periods if you have heart/respiratory problems.

Hip Protect yourself from falls by being careful whilst out and about and ensure you wear suitable footwear.

Home Make sure your home is kept warm and well insulated. Your main living room should be between 18-21C (64-70F), the rest of the house at a minimum of 16C (61F). You can use a hot-water bottle or electric blanket (not both at the same time) to keep warm while you are in bed.

Remember also to keep active. Move around at least once an hour and don't sit down for long periods of time. Even light exercise will help keep you warm.

Look out for elderly friends and neighbours. Check they are safe and well through the winter. Make sure they are warm enough, especially at night, and have stocks of food and medicines so they don't need to go out during very cold weather. Loneliness can also be a problem so stay and have a chat if at all possible.
