Nature Notes



Our weather keeps us guessing! We are only half way through August but it feels rather autumnal, especially in the early morning

and late evening. We have had cold nights too for the time year. It has also been windy and all these factors have not helped butterflies. Last week-end I did a butterfly count for the annual survey and only spotted 9, two thirds of them were white ones. I can not remember when I last saw a small tortoiseshell. Butterfly numbers vary from year to year and area to area, but the days of seeing a buddleia bush covered in butterflies has gone.

The pond continues to attract wildlife. The kingfisher is now a regular visitor; mostly the adult male, with black beak and red feet, but we have seen the adult female which has red lower bill (remembered by thinking a female wears lipstick!). The ducks have been coming regularly, up to 4; they all have the female plumage, they are probably youngsters although it could be an adult female with juveniles in tow. Yesterday morning a little egret came into the garden and landed on the large cherry tree. It stayed for quite a while, even resting on one leg for a time before it disappeared. On warm sunny days we have dragonflies and damselflies. In the evenings the pond attracts insects which in turn attract bats. I love watching them as they twist and turn using echolocation to find their prey. I think we have 2 species as I can see two different sizes; possibly pipistrelle and the larger long-eared bat.

The swallows in the stables have a second brood in the nest now; I looked in earlier and could see 3 beaks arranged around the edge of the nest, although there may be more. The first broods in both of the house martin nests fledged but it was difficult to count how many. The nests are still being used and I am optimistic that both have second broods but I have yet to hear any cheeping from hatched chicks. The swifts have already departed; they seem to come and go all too quickly. I didn't see or hear them in town much this year, probably due to windy conditions.

There have been a good number of young blackbirds reared in the garden this year. I have also been lucky to see a juvenile song thrush, they are so secretive and I feel privileged when I see an adult out in the open. We have also seen young robins in the garden with their speckled breast, just showing a hint of red at the top as it changes to the adult plumage. The young great spotted woodpecker still visits the peanuts but not quite so frequently now. There has also been a juvenile green woodpecker in the garden; it comes to raid the ant nests, which we have plenty of; in between the paving slabs along the edge of the pond is a favourite place.

Kingston Deverill School Logbook - part 17

1948 – Jun 14: Children go to Mr Stratton for a short visit to see the sheep-shearing. Jun 17: Standards 1 – 1V go to the brickyards in Crockerton to see the processes of brick making, tile making and pottery.



Successive generations of KD children would have been aware of sheep-farming from time immemorial, since that was what the down land which rose above them was all about. A springtime visit to the lambing sheds, whence the incessant bleating spread throughout the village, was a special treat; as was the later introduction to sheepshearing. Pottery had been made at Crockerton – hence the name – since the 13th century, but had been largely replaced in the early 19th century by brick and tile-making. One of the clay pits was on the site now occupied by the ornamental lake at the Lakeside Garden Centre at LD. Nov 1: chimney and ceiling repairs in holidays. Fire in main classroom smoking too badly to continue fire. Report sent to Rector. It appears that the Rector (at this point Cecil Caldwell) is still the local 'manager' of the school, but doubtless he would pass on this reported problem to the LEA who would have paid for the chimney and ceiling repairs. Nov 11: Mr Stratton gives a talk on the dairy. Nov 18: Mr Stratton gives talk on nitrogen in soil and plant food. Dec 2: Mr Stratton gives talk on birds. The LEA's 'control' of the school did not affect the continued input of the Stratton family. Dec 20: - new tortoise stove installed in *holiday.* Considering how long the school had to wait, the new stove is well-named.

1949 – Apr 3: Miss Stratton gives a talk on her trip to Gibraltar. Jul 23: 3 children transferred to Mere, 1 to Trowbridge. The Admissions Register reveals that most children went to Senior School at Mere, and that there was otherwise an almost equal spread between those going on to Warminster or Trowbridge, together with the very occasional scholarship entry to Dauntsey's School at West Lavington.

1950 - Apr 25: Standards 11 - 1V visit Warminster Station in afternoon. Shown around by Stationmaster. Sep 4: 24 on roll. I regret to record the loss of Mr Stratton during the holiday. Mr R Stratton is the new correspondent. The elder Richard Stratton was the grandson of the original member of the Stratton family who took over the tenancy of KD Manor Farm in 1865. His son – a second Richard and father of the current owner of the farm, kept up, as did his family, the 'correspondent' interest in the school until its closure in 1969. Oct 31: Mrs Stratton gave a talk on her holiday in France, 1951-27 on roll, May 20: Mr Stratton gave picture of Bluebell Woods to school. Jun 6: Stoolball match with Maiden Bradley. This mention of 'Stoolball' is fascinating in that the game, a variation of cricket, died out as an activity in schools during the later 1950s. It was invented in Sussex in the 15th century and there are still adult Stoolball leagues in the county. Dec 7: children to Warminster for carol festival. 1952- 29 on roll. Jul 3: school goes to Mere to see the Oueen. The Oueen had acceded to the throne on February 6th 1952 and she was in Mere on one of her many perambulations round the country prior to her Coronation the following year.

1953-26 on roll. Jun 2: Television and tea in school on the day of the Coronation of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth. This may have been the second view of the Queen for many of the children, but for all of them and the adults, it would certainly be the first time that they had sat in front of a television – black and white – and lots of 'snow'.

Deverills Cricket Club After a disappointing start to the year with a number of matches cancelled due to lack of players the Deverills Cricket Club opened their season with a hard fought victory over Bratton at Kingston Deverill on



commendable commitment to the team by cutting short a holiday in Scotland in order to make up the full complement. The skipper showed his appreciation by asking him to open the bowling with a six over spell up the hill, into the wind. 0 for 20 later he retired to the deep to spend the rest of the afternoon diving after lost causes. Working on the adage that bad balls get wickets, Dan House ran through his full repertoire before being rewarded by having Bratton's well established opening batsman bowled by a half-tracker. No doubt stunned by his team-mates somewhat muted response to the dismissal, he then showed that good deliveries also take wickets by dismissing Bratton's dangerous number 4 with a beautiful off-break. Graham Mitchell made an impressive debut for the club. While considerable excitement surrounds the prospect of his eldest son bolstering the Deverill's bowling attack after an impressive pre-season net display, Mitchell's wily off spin stemmed the flow of runs and was deservedly rewarded with his first wicket for the club. The sky darkened with every further wicket that fell and by the time Bratton reached 142 for 9 the heavens opened. Tea was taken early as the rain continued to fall. With significant time lost the captains consulted the Duckworth-Lewis charts to finally agree that the Deverills would have exactly the same number of overs as Bratton to chase the same number of runs. With the pitch condition now looking a little uncertain, captain Read gave up his usual opening spot and instead promoted Robins and House so he could take a look at the wicket from the safety of the boundary. His confidence was rewarded as the openers saw off a tight spell from Bratton's leading bowlers. Following a number of lucky wickets skipper Read and keeper Stratton found themselves at the crease together. The partnership developed well with both speeding into double figures. However Stratton's form disintegrated almost as quickly as his cricket shoes and he was dismissed 14. As if the pitch wasn't difficult enough after all the rain now the batsmen had to contend with the remains of Strattons size 11 GMs sticking out of the wicket. Coming together at 62-4 Read and Mead provided the backbone of the Deverill's innings with a composed partnership of 41. This being Deverill's cricket however, a game isn't complete without a collapse and sure enough Mead's dismissal for 18 was quickly followed by two more wickets. That left Read and Jim Downe at the crease with 20 needed to win. Read adopted his usual policy of running as little as possible and struck boundaries with ease. As the total neared Downe rolled back the years and capitalised on the defensive field to scurry between the wickets for two runs to bring up the victory. The only two Deverills players not celebrating were the Richards-Fisher brothers who had been waiting patiently all afternoon for their chance to punish the Bratton bowling. No doubt their chance will come.

Do you want to save money on your heating oil?

Some people have found that they are being charged up to 25p per litre more than NOBC prices, particularly on a supplier's automatic top up scheme! Two reminders to order per month are emailed individually to the members by the system. Delivery takes place either by the middle or end of the month and once the total amount required is known, negotiations with the oil companies take place. The order is then placed and details of individual orders are circulated to the members so that they can check that their order has been correctly recorded. Deliveries are made by the middle or end of each month. Members pay the successful oil company direct, NOBC's role is only to negotiate the most advantageous price. Over the last 12 months, we have ordered 625.000 litres and saved people a lot of money. To join the club, go to nadder.oilbuyingclub.com and register. You will then be approved and receive the two reminders a month to order oil. The system enables you to order for more than one tank and to specify additives for Agas. There are only 2 rules, first all communication is by email and second payment must be made on receipt of the supplying oil company invoice. See www.nadder.oilbyingclub.com

Information for Riparian Owners



The Parish Council has received queries regarding cutting river weed and would like to highlight the points below:

Who can cut river weed? Riparian owners or interested parties who use the river, such as fishing or boating clubs and farmers, may want aquatic weed to be cut. Cuts can be undertaken by anyone with the appropriate capabilities on the basis that they have the riparian owner's permission and they should apply for an exemption to cut the weed from the Environment Agency and, in some circumstances, approval may be required from Natural England. Anyone undertaking cutting will be required to remove the weed from the river as in accordance with Regulation 38(1) of the Environmental Permitting Regulations 2010, which makes it an offence to cut vegetation cannot be left along the bank and must be appropriately disposed of. If you intend to move the cut weed from the river side to another place of disposal, you will need to register this activity. Please contact the Environment Agency for details. If the weed cut is to be performed in a Site of Special Scientific Interest, you will also need approval from your local Natural England office (Tel: 0300 060 4628).
